"This," it asserts, "is authentic atheism even if camouflaged as cosmic pantheism."

New York City, June 13.—A series of events in celebration of the 50th anniversary of the ordination of Msgr. Michael J. Lavelle, rector of St. Patrick's Cathedral, came to a close with a mammoth banquet Monday evening. Justice Victor J. Dowling was chairman of the committee which arranged the dinner. The speakers were Cardinal Hayes, former Governor Alfred E. Smith and Mayor James J. Walker.

In thanksgiving for the completion of 50 years in the priesthood by Msgr. Michael J. Lavelle, more than 2,000 adult parishioners received Holy Communion, Sunday.

On special order from His Holiness, Pope Plus XI, the emblem of Prototony Apostolic was conferred upon Msgr. Michael J. Lavelle by Cardinal Hayes at solemn high-Mass in St. Patrick Cathedral during the week. No one else in the Archdiocese of New York has received this distinction.

Msgr. Lavelle was presented with a purse by his people, and he received many private gifts. He has been connected with St. Patrick's Cathedral his entire priestly life, eight years as assistant, and 42 years as pastor.

Former Governor Alvan T. Fuller of Massachusetts, who is a Protestant, sent a check for \$100 to Msgr. Lavelle's jubilee purse and a personal letter. He said that twenty-five years ago he had heard Msgr. Lavelle preach a sermon and it had made such an impression on him that he had carried it through life.

Moscow, June 13.—The Russian Government is making every effort to replace Christmas by the feast of Lenin, which is celebrated on January 20. Last Christmas, the sale of Christmas trees was forbidden. Many factories in Moscow forced their employees to sign a declaration, stating that they would not celebrate Christmas, but would continue working on the Christian Feast of the Nativity. In numerous shop windows, in place of the traditional Christmas touches, figures and pictures were displayed ridiculing the infant Jesus. Considerable excitement was aroused by the attitude of the Government in this matter, and popular sentiment was by no means wholly in sympathy with the authorities.

The Rev. J. V. Curtin

The Rev. J. V. Curtin was born May 3, 1884 in Moravia, the son of Bartholomew Curtin and Eliza Brennan Curtin. He made his studies in Moravia High School, St. Andrew's Seminary and St. Bernard's Seminary, and was ordained a priest by Bishop Hickey, June 8, 1912. He was one year assistant pastor of St. Augustine's Church and then took up his work as a teacher. As pastor of St. John's Church in Clyde, he also will have charge of St. Patrick's Parish in Savannah.

Father Curtin's long connection with St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary has made him greatly beloved by the students and the graduates of that school. He has been an excellent teacher, capable, inspiring, helpful and persevering in his work. He is greatly beloved at St. Andrew's, and he will enter upon the work of his first parish with the good will and the prayers of a large number of friends, that his pastorate may be fruitful and his labors productive of much good for the Church he loves.

The Rev. Charles J. Bruton

The Rev. Charles J. Bruton, Ph.D. is a native of Oxford and studied at the Churchville High School, St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries. He was ordained by Bishop Hickey in St. Patrick's Cathedral, June 10, 1916. His parents are Michael J. Bruton and Ella Brady Bruton of Churchville.

Father Bruton was assistant pastor at St. Bridget's Parish for one year following his ordination, assistant pastor of the Immaculate Conception Church until his appointment as chaplain in the United States Army with the rank of first lieutenant in July, 1918. He served in France with the A. E. F. around Perigeaux, until the close of the war. His service in France gave him added opportunity to study the French language, and to attain that proficiency which fitted him for the position of professor of French in the Rochester Catholic High School, to which he was appointed in 1919. Father Bruton has been serving during the past few months as assistant pastor of St. Patrick's Cathedral. He has been active in the American Legion. As a teacher he has been thorough in his work, and has been greatly beloved by his students.

Bishop O'Hern Ordains Eleven Priests Here

Officiates for First Time at Impressive Ceremony in St. Patrick's Cathedral Last Saturday

The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, ordained eleven young men to the priesthood in St. Patrick's Cathedral last Saturday morning. It was the first time Bishop O'Hern had ever officiated at an ordination service. He carried out the ritual of the ordination service in a way that impressed all with its beauty and solemnity.

Five of the students ordained will be stationed in the Rochester diocese, three in Syracuse, two in Providence and one in Nashville, Tenn.

Those ordained for the Rochester Diocese were: Rev. Thomas Francis Brennan, Rev. Benedict Aloysius Ehmann, Rev. Gerald Cornelius Lambert, of Rochester; Rev. Stanislaus Bernard Krolak, Elmira; Rev. John Beecher Sullivan, Bath.

For Syracuse: Rev. Francis Stephen Holouskil, Rev. James Patrick Kiely, Rev. Joseph Ignatius Ritehle. For Providence: Rev. Thomas Henry Barry, Rev. Francis Casoy.

For Nashville: Rev. Aaron Gillen. Several hundred relatives, friends, clergy of the diocese and members of the various sisterhoods filled to overflowing every seat in St. Patrick's Cathedral during the ordination.

At the pontifical low Mass, which was said by Bishop O'Hern, without music, responses were sung by students of St. Bernard's Seminary, under direction of the Rev. John M. Petter, director of music at the seminary.

Assisting Bishop O'Hern in the Mass were the Very Rev. Msgr. James J. Hartley, assistant priest, and the Very Rev. Msgr. Andrew B. Mechan, president of St. Bernard's Seminary, master of ceremonies.

In addition to the officiating clergymen, each of the eleven newly ordained priests was assisted in reading the Mass aloud with Bishop O'Hern by an older priest of the diocese, following the imposition of hands. Investing them with priestly power.

The gold chalice used by Bishop O'Hern in the Mass was the one presented the late Bishop McQuaid on his golden anniversary to the priesthood in beauty and design this chalice is one of the finest of its kind, and was given to Rochester's first bishop by his devoted parishioners. It is used on all solemn pontifical occasions.

After bathing in the piscines the pain disappeared and Mrs. Hayes found she was able to walk.

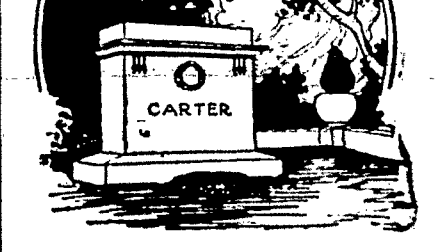
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
