The steel work for the large two-story and basement structure has been practically completed and brick work has advanced nearly to the second floor. The school will be a modern fireproof structure and is expected to be opened early in 1930.
 Bishop O'Hern will arrive in Elmira, Saturday morning, June 29th, and will officiate at Confirmation services at the Elmira Reformatory in the morning. Sunday he will be the guest of Elmira Council, Knights of Columbus, at its annual Communion breakfast in the Mark Twain Hotel.

Nazareth College Second Graduation A Beautiful Event

(Continued from Page One)
 intellectual attainments. Among them we need only mention Catherine of Siena, St. Angela de Merici, St. Jane Frances de Chantal, and especially the great doctor of the Church, St. Theresa of Avila.
 Moreover we have only to turn to that period of the world when the

Church was a predominant factor in all European affairs, the Thirteenth Century—a time when she was supreme spiritually and extended her benign influence even over temporal affairs—to learn her educational policies. At the time of the Lateran Council of the 13th Century every bishop was required by the law of his church to establish close to his Cathedral Church professorships the equivalent to a college education of our day.
 Great Armies of Students.
 "According to the best statistics at this period of the world's history, there were more students at Oxford and Cambridge, in proportion to the population of the England of that day, than we had in our own great city of New York as late as 1910. For history tells us that while this great army of students was patronizing universities of the British Isles, at the same time there were no less than 15,000 students at the University of Bologna in Italy, and 20,000 at the University of Paris in France. While this great educational army was doing its work in the north of Italy, in France, and England, at Salerno in the south of Italy there was a school of medicine which arose under the auspices of the Benedictine Monastery at Montecassino, with an archbishop at its head, and one of its most distinguished professors a woman named Trotula, the wife of one professor and the mother of another.
 "At Bologna, Alessandra Gilina was assisting the great Professor

and she became the inventor of the first successful modern means of embalming the human body. At the same time Madame Manzolini discovered a method of reproducing the tissues of the human body in colored wax for anatomical studies.
 A Traveling University
 "We think that the idea of a 'traveling university' is entirely modern. But we are mistaken, for way back in the ninth century there was a traveling university known as the Palace School, organized under Charlemagne and conducted from place to place, wherever the Royal Court was held. In fact, in the history of the Church whenever we find great movements for education or for humanity sponsored by some distinguished man, oftentimes a saint, we find side by side with him a noble woman who might be called his co-adjutor and helpmate. Thus Saint Scholastica took her place beside Benedict, Bridget by Patrick, Clare by St. Francis, Theresa by St. John of God, St. Jane Frances de Chantal by St. Francis de Sales, Madame Le Bras by St. Vincent de Paul, and St. Madame Sophie Barat by Father Varin. Hildegarde was an authoress of textbooks in medicine, and Hros witha, the nun of Gandersheim, of Latin comedies in those days of the middle ages.
 Education a Watchword
 All of this was done and carried on under the immediate protection of the Church, from the popes down to the greatest scholars directing the movements. In fact, with the very advent of Christianity education became a watchword, and with the conversion of Ireland as a nation to the teachings of Christ the Emerald Isle became the great center of the intellectual activities of the world.
 "Thus there have been at it were, a series of cycles covering three centuries when womankind has occupied herself with things educational and external to household duties. These cycles are known as the University Period in the Middle Ages, the Renaissance in the 13th Century and our times since the 16th Century.
 Tribute to Nazareth
 "Today we thank God for the Catholic colleges for our young women scattered all over America, and we thank God for our Sisterhoods through whom these colleges were made possible. Each year the Church is sending out into society some of the best types of American womanhood, instructed and ready to take up their duties, in the family life, professional life and in the educational world. Side by side with their intellectual attainments there

has gone on a character building which must make for true womanhood and true citizenship. So today we congratulate Nazareth college and its graduates we congratulate their parents, relatives and friends, we congratulate our city, our state and our nation on the genuine asset of true womanhood which the Nazareth Alma Mater gives to the world in her Class of 1929.
