

### Perkinsville Parish Welcomes New Pastor, Says Good-Bye to Old

#### Rev. Charles Riefer Succeeds Rev. Ferdinand Scheid, Who Comes to St. Michael's—Beautiful Chalice Given Father Scheid

Over 400 people at the Fireman's Hall in Perkinsville Monday evening bade farewell to Rev. Ferdinand Scheid and welcomed the new pastor of Sacred Heart Church—Rev. Charles Riefer of St. Andrew's Seminary, Rochester.

A progressive complimentary dinner was served by the ladies of the Sacred Heart parish to the large assemblage of guests in the dining room. Following the first course, Mr. Stephen Giesner, president of the Young Men's Athletic Club, on behalf of the congregation presented Father Scheid with a beautiful gold chalice. Mr. Giesner also gave Father Scheid, as the Moderator of the organization, \$100 in gold, the gift of the Club; and on behalf of the children of the parish \$20 in gold. Father Scheid, although deeply moved, in his acceptance of the three gifts spoke words which will be treasured by the parishioners to whose spiritual welfare he has so faithfully administered for twelve and a half years, and which will still further endear him to every member of the parish.

Rev. Leo G. Hofschneider, pastor of St. Mary's Church, Danville, told of his acquaintance with Father Scheid covering a period of over 30 years, of the cordial friendly feeling that had always existed during the years they had been associated in neighboring parishes, Perkinsville and Danville, and of the noble qualities of his brother priest, who has a heart as large as his stature. He told Father Scheid of the high esteem in which he was held by Danville people and their sincere appreciation of the assistance he had rendered on the occasions of special services for the past 20 years at St. Mary's Church, Danville.

Following the dinner, the guests adjourned to the hall for the reception of the new pastor of the Sacred Heart parish, Rev. Charles Riefer. Mr. Stephen Giesner spoke words of hearty welcome on behalf of the congregation. Father Riefer responded in an address which was full of instructive and kind words. Rev. John E. Massett of St. Patrick's Church represented Danville in an eloquent speech and remarked feelingly upon the scene that all had witnessed this evening—an orderly and spontaneous outpouring of friendship and loyalty for the outgoing pastor as well as his successor, Rev. Arthur Florack, pastor of the Catholic Church at Wayland, represented Wayland in expressive speech of calm for the retiring pastor and greetings to the new one.

### Federal Education Advisors Include Catholic Priests

#### Secretary Wilbur Names McGr. Ed-ward A. Pace and Dr. George Johnson To Serve On His Special Committee

Washington, June 20.—The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Edward A. Pace, Vice-Rector of the Catholic University of America, and the Rev. Dr. George Johnson of the Catholic University and Executive Secretary of the Department of Education, N. C. W. C., are members of the advisory committee on education appointed by Secretary of Interior Wilbur, which met here recently. It is believed this is the first time in history that representatives of Catholic educational agencies have been invited by the Federal Government to participate in such an undertaking.

The advisory committee, which is made up of 46 representatives of educational institutions and of organizations interested in education from all parts of the country, has been appointed to study the relations of the National Government to education. Secretary Wilbur has divided it into three sections. The first will study Federal activities in education, the second Federal grants to colleges, and the third, Federal grants to schools of less than college grade.

Monksignor Pace, as a member of the committee, represents the Catholic University of America with the approval of the executive committee of the Board of Trustees of the University.

Dr. Johnson, as a member of the committee, represents the National Catholic Educational Association with the approval of the Administrative Committee of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

### Flag Contest Prize Winner Catholic Boy

Robert L. Sullivan of Cathedral High School of Syracuse Leads All Boy Contestants

Washington, June 20.—Robert L. Sullivan, a pupil of Cathedral Catholic High School, Troy, N. Y., won the national championship in the boys' division of the First Annual National Flag Contest of the United States Flag Association, sponsored by the Hearst newspapers, in the final competition held on the east steps of the United States Capitol here last night.

Mary S. McGonigal, a pupil of the Willard School, Troy, N. Y., won the national championship in the girls' division. Merle M. Clarke, of Sault Ste. Marie Senior High School, Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., and Alma Groves of Byronville, Ga., who won second place in their respective divisions, became Boy and Girl National Flag Escorts. The four victors will be taken on a trip around the world, beginning June 25, from San Francisco.

Eleven of the 36 regional champions gathered here for the Flag Contest are pupils of Catholic schools. A number of other regional champions here are Catholics, but not pupils of Catholic schools. Four of the eight finalists, selected from among the 36 regional champions, are Catholic school pupils.

### Ray J. Gartland, Popular Athlete, Drowned in Lake

#### Son of Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester J. Gartland of Bryan Street Met Tragic Death While Bathing

Raymond J. Gartland, 23 years old, who had just completed his sophomore year at the University of Rochester, was drowned in the lake at Ontario Beach Park early Tuesday evening this week while bathing in the lake. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester J. Gartland of 128 Bryan Street, a member of Holy Rosary Church, and a splendid type of young man.

Raymond and his brother, Sylvester, Jr., were riding on a log in the lake, about 300 feet from the shore, when the waves from a passing motor boat upset them over. Both could swim, but the waves submerged them, and they cried for help. The lifeboat at the beach, leaky and without oars, was unfit for use. A number of swimmers answered the cries. William J. Jans, 19 years old, of 4 Mayflower Street, and Richard Amerson, resident of Sylvester, Jr., but Raymond sank in the waters of the lake, and it was nearly a half hour before lifebuoys recovered his body. Efforts to revive him were fruitless.

The body was taken home to his bereaved relatives, and the funeral held in Holy Rosary Church at 9:30 o'clock this Saturday morning, with interment in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery. Raymond is survived by his parents; two brothers, Edward and Sylvester, Jr., and one sister, Mrs. Raymond A. Filke. He was a star athlete at the University of Rochester, a fine student, and a young man greatly beloved by all who knew him. The sincere sympathy of many taken will be extended to the bereaved parents and other relatives.

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
