Churches in Mexico, Closed for Three Years, Will be Re-Opened Soon; Bishop O'Hern Pays Eloquent Tribute to Womanhood at Nazareth

Religious Troubles In Mexico Settled; Peace Pact Signed

Bishops, Priests and Nuns, Exiled for Three Years, to Return And Churches to be Re-Opened—Government Will Register No Priests Except Those Approved By Bishops—Terms Given Out

MILLIONS OF MEXICAN PEOPLE REJOICE AND JOIN IN PRAYER AND THANKSGIVING

Mexico City, June 27.—Religious peace again is to reign in Mexico. The exiled bishops, priests and nuns are to return, and the churches, closed for three years, are to be reopened. This was assured last Friday afternoon when there was made known here the approval of the Vatican to the peace terms agreed upon by Archbishop Leopoldo Ruiz y Flores, Apostolic Delegate to Mexico, and Provisional President Emilio Portes Gil.
