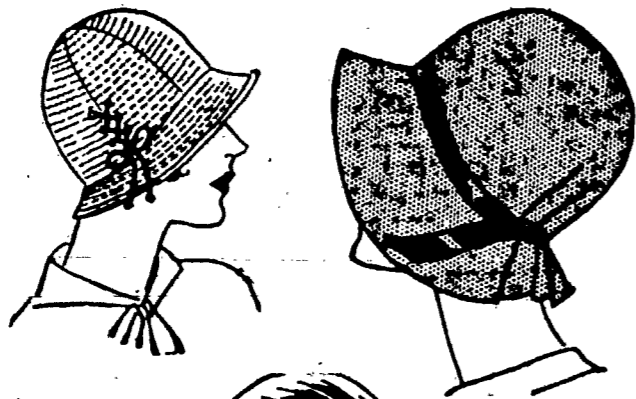

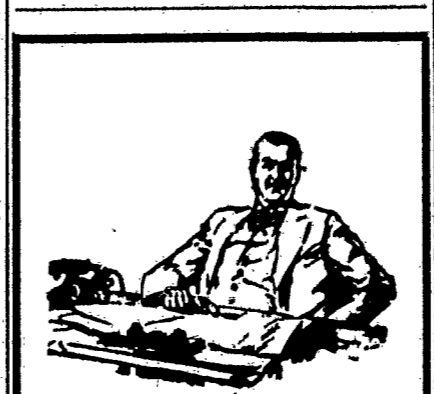
Mrs. Martin P. Hollehan
