Sunday, July 14.—St. Bonaventure, known as the "Scarlet Doctor," when asked by St. Thomas Aquinas why he drew his scarlet hair, replied by pointing to the crucifix. He was the abbot of St. Isabel in the Kingdom of Castile, 1170-1180. He died during the reign of King Alfonso VIII of Castile.

Monday, July 15.—St. Henry, the patron of the city of New York, died in 1042. He was a Duke of Bavaria, who was killed in 1024. He devoted his life to the service of the church. Lowell, Mass., July 11.—James O'Sullivan, internationally known maker of rubber heels, died here recently at the age of 83 years. Mr. O'Sullivan, who had been retired from active business for about 20 years, was an active member of St. Patrick's parish, the Holy Name Society, the Third Order of St. Francis and the Ancient Order of Hibernians. Mr. O'Sullivan was born in Ireland and came to this country in 1867.

Holy Name Sisters Will Have \$30,000 School in Florida

Tampa, Fla., July 11.—Work has begun on a \$30,000 school building here for the Holy Name Sisters, a colored Catholic organization. Completion of the building is expected within 60 days. It was announced by the Rev. J. J. Ferdinand, S.S.J. The site was previously occupied by the Sisters' elementary school for 25 years. The new building will have six classrooms and an auditorium. The old structure will be remodeled as a clubhouse for members of the parish.

Friday, July 12.—St. Vincent de Paul, who was born in 1576, devoted his life to the care of the poor and the instruction of the rich in the ways of charity. Soon after his ordination he was captured by corsairs and carried into Barbary where he converted his renegade master and with him escaped to France. The saint was made chaplain-general of the galley of France where his charity brought hope into those prisons where only despair had reigned before.

Saturday, July 13.—St. Margaret, virgin and martyr, suffered at Antioch in Syria in the last general persecution. She is said to have been presented to her own father, a pagan priest, and after many tortures, to have gloriously finished her martyrdom by the sword.

Detroit K. of C. To Start Building \$500,000 Home

Detroit, July 11.—Having completed plans for a new Knights of Columbus clubhouse to be erected in East Jefferson avenue here, where a broad, practical boy guidance program is to be conducted in conjunction with its own activities, Gabriel Richard Council, K. of C., together with its building company's directors, has announced a popular subscription campaign to raise a half million dollars for this work.

Carl A. Walzel, Grand Knight of the Council, said that the need for such work in Detroit, and the success of like activities elsewhere have been studied for two years, and that the program contemplated will conform with the recommendations of the leaders of the Big Guidance Bureau of the Knights of Columbus, of which the late Brother Barnabas, R.S.C., was the moving spirit.

The clubhouse planned by the Council will be a six-story structure. There will be a spacious swimming pool, several handball courts, a gymnasium, vocational work-play rooms, reading and lecture rooms, a billiard room and other recreational facilities. There are also to be 161 residence rooms. The actual leadership and supervision of boy activities will be in the hands of trained leaders, graduates of the Hologogy Department of the University of Notre Dame.

"Cozy" Right Word to Describe This Artistic Little Bungalow Home

In order to get the best effect with any home, its design should be such that it fits in with its surroundings. For instance, where there is plenty of shrubbery and some trees a house similar to that one in the accompanying illustration blends itself admirably to such surroundings. This bungalow has the exterior appearance of the home which is built in the woods. When set on a lot where there is a background of trees or enough trees to surround it, it makes a most delightful small home.

"Cozy" seems just the word to describe this little bungalow home. The matted gables and dormers effectively break up the low roof expanse and the alternate wide and narrow single course make most pleasing outer walls.

With the outside walls covered with shingles.

The central entrance leads to a hall at one side of which is the living room, which extends the depth of the house and is 11 feet wide and 23 feet long. On the opposite side of the hall at the front is the dining room, 11 feet 6 inches by 12 feet, and back of that is a large kitchen 12 feet 3 by 9 feet 6 with the breakfast nook adjoining. On the side wall of the living room is an open fireplace and directly opposite on the outside wall are double french doors which open into a sun porch, which is 7 feet 6 by 13 feet.

Out of the entrance hall run the stairs to the second floor where there are two large bedrooms, one being 11 feet by 13 feet and the other 14 feet by 11 feet. Both of these bedrooms have closets at the front made possible by the dormer windows set in the roof. There is a large bathroom opening off the hall at the head of the stairs.

An examination of the floor plans which accompany the exterior view of the home show the arrangement of the rooms and the size of each one. This is a very fine design for the family which wants a small cozy home of artistic appearance and will be unusually attractive set on a lot where there is an opportunity for planting of shrubs and flowers and where there are some trees.

Loss of Heat Through Asbestos Paper Shown

The objection to common asbestos paper used as a heat insulator on hot-air pipes was worked out some years ago by investigators at the University of Illinois. They were able to show that more heat was lost through pipes thus covered than through pipes on which no insulation was used. However, where cellular asbestos was used, adequate insulation was obtained.
