Around the Diocese

Geneva Catholics Plan New Central High School To Be Ready Next Fall

Church Home Building Will Have \$50,000 Addition to Care For Students From the Parish Schools—Plans Approved By Bishop O'Hern

Geneva, July 18.—A \$50,000 addition will be erected at once to the Church Home Building, and the building will be made a central high school for Catholic students from the parochial schools. It will be known as the DeSales Institute, and it will be ready for classes when the schools open in September. Present plans are carried out. Announcement to this effect was made in St. Francis de Sales' Church and in St. Stephen's Church here last Sunday. There are at present four classrooms in the Church Home building, which will be retained. An addition of four classrooms and a study hall approximately 50 by 40 feet will be made to the building. This has already been started. The need for additional Catholic school facilities has been apparent here for some time. Both the St.

Francis de Sales and St. Stephen's parochial schools are overcrowded. At St. Francis de Sales it was necessary to use the school basement and have part-time classes. At St. Stephen's the rooms were overcrowded. Plans for the new Central High School were taken up with Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D. D., Bishop of Rochester, at a recent visit of the Bishop to Geneva. It was found that St. Stephen's parish furnishes 116 and St. Francis de Sales parish 118 pupils to the high school, and that as an addition to St. Francis de Sales school would only partly solve the problem of furnishing adequate school facilities that the proper solution lay in the parishes uniting to provide central high school. The plan has been approved by the school authorities of the diocese and work will be rushed so that the school will be ready this fall.

She has served as a teacher in St. Patrick's School here for 14 years and prior to that she taught in St. Patrick's parish, Seneca Falls and Holy Apostles parish, Rochester. She has accomplished a great deal of good in the 25 years of her convent life, and she will have the prayers and good wishes of many people for many more years of useful and helpful work.

GENESEO St. Mary's Church Confirmation Class

Geneseo, July 18.—Last Sunday afternoon the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D. D., Bishop of Rochester, conferred a class of more than 150 children in St. Mary's Church in this village, and a smaller class at St. Lucy's Church, Retof. There were large congregations present at each church. Bishop O'Hern spoke impressively at both ceremonies. He explained to the children that the Sacrament of Confirmation would make them strong and perfect soldiers of Jesus Christ, and he urged them to be faithful soldiers, brave and true in following our Divine Lord all through their lives. His talks were heard with sincere appreciation, both by the children and by adults. The Rev. Edward Dayer, Ph. D., S. T. B., is pastor of both churches, and under his direction the confirmation classes had been well trained. Bishop O'Hern congratulated him sincerely on the good work evidenced. There were a number of priests present at the ceremonies, and altogether it was a great day for the Catholic people of Geneseo and of Retof.

Fire Does Much Damage To Shortsville Church, Causing Loss of \$15,000

Blaze Breaks Out at Noon Wednesday—Shortsville and Manchester Firemen Do Splendid Work—Services Sunday

Shortsville, July 18.—Fire broke out in St. Dominic's Church in this village at noon yesterday and did damage to the interior of the structure to the amount of about \$15,000 before the flames were subdued. Firemen from Shortsville and Manchester responded quickly to an alarm, and practically everybody in the village turned out to help. The flames had a good start when discovered, and it took the firemen quite a few minutes to get them under control. Smoke, water and fire caused such damage that practically the entire interior of the church will have to be built over. The flames ate their way through the walls in one or two places, but not so the body of the church will have to be re-built. The altar of the church was not damaged a particle. Not a stick of it from water, smoke or fire. But the organ, vestments and vestment case, pews, walls, windows, etc., were badly damaged. The interior of the church had been newly decorated at a cost of more than \$1,500. In spite of the fire, Rev. John A. Napier, rector of the church, announced to-day that Masses will be celebrated in the church as usual on Sunday, at 7:30 and 9:30 A. M. The damages will be repaired just as soon as the insurance adjustment is made. It is thought that defective wiring caused the blaze. "Please express my sincere and hearty thanks to the Shortsville and Manchester firemen," Rev. John A. Napier said to-day. "They responded very quickly to the alarm, and by their efficient work and energetic action they prevented the total destruction of the church, and kept the fire from being a menace to surrounding property. We are all pleased with them, and proud of them."
