Ortanna, Pa., July 18.—Father Will Whalen, of the Old Jesuit Mission, Buchanan Valley, has hit on a scheme for keeping restless babies occupied in church.

"A baby simply must move in order to grow," he said. "Otherwise how will he ever develop any muscles? It's nature's way of making a child fit. And when a baby is hampered in a pew, he has only one way to demand liberty and freedom: he howls. Which of course doesn't aid the religious concentration of his elders, particularly during a sermon. I leave a box of lollypops in the vestibule, taking care every candy has a stout stick, and the mothers give the very small children one of them." He smiled. "I have seen some of the mothers take a lick themselves! Perhaps they did it to please baby, but I think it was to please themselves. Church on Sunday is the one big bright spot for lonely farm women, and it's cruel to expect mothers to stay at home because they have nursing babies. And I saw women in agony trying to keep the wee ones quiet during homilies. A woman gave her two-toothed son her long rosary which bore a heavy crucifix on the end. The lad whined it and struck an old gentleman on the bald spot who was nodding peacefully in the pew ahead. The whack could be heard distinctly, and the old gentleman looked positively murderous. The lollypops work best."

Louvain, July 18.—In Namur, the episcopal see of the Rt. Rev.
