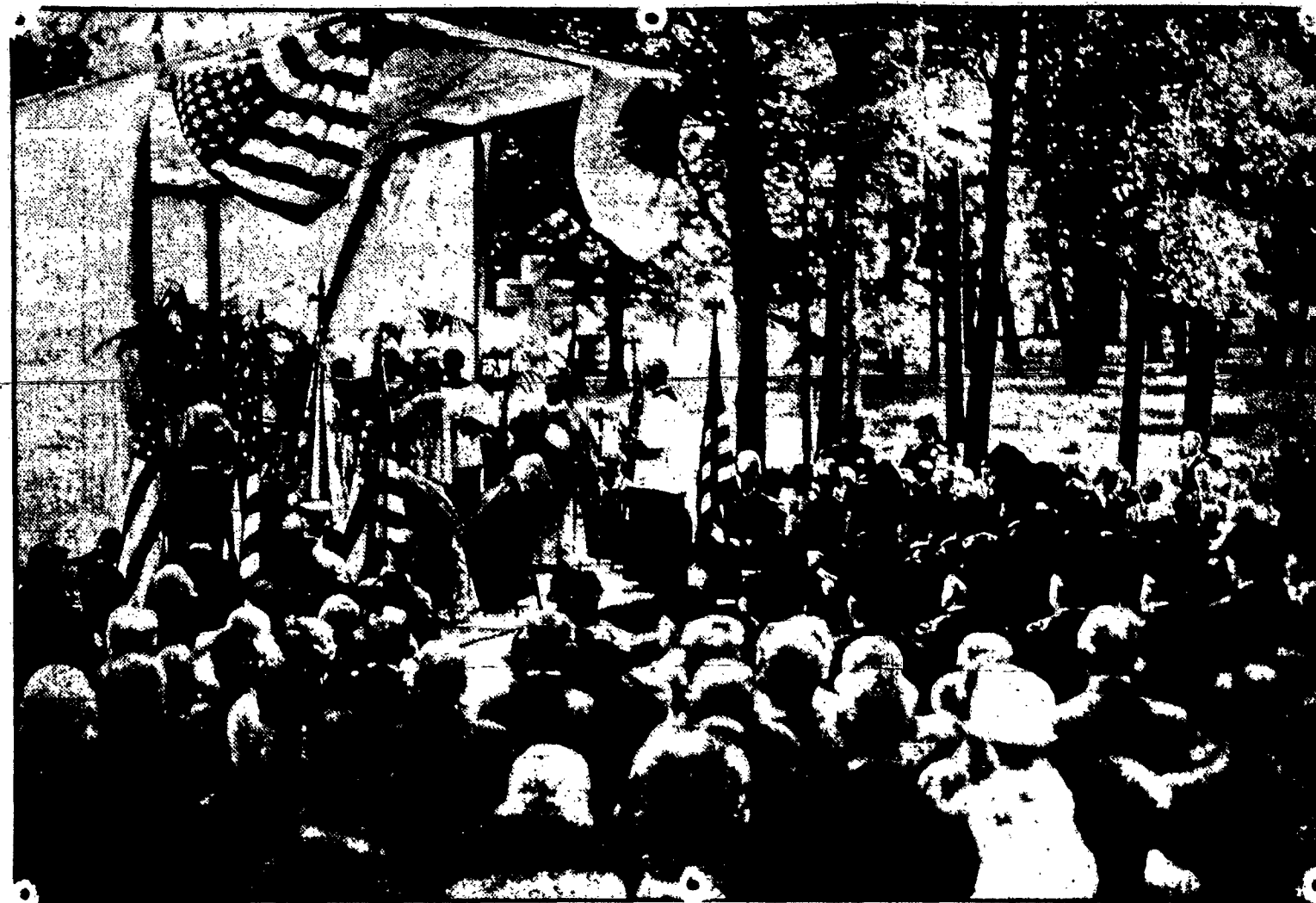
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The Annual Field Mass in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery

Bishop Is Celebrant Annual Field Mass Knights of St. John

Beautiful and Impressive Ceremony, Attended by Three Thousand People, Held in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery—Bishop O'Hern Gives History of Cemetery in an Excellent Talk to the Knights

AUTOMOBILES ALLOWED IN CEMETERY EXCEPT SATURDAYS, SUNDAYS, HOLY DAYS

Three thousand Knights of St. John, members of Ladies Auxiliaries and friends were present at the annual field Mass for the Knights of St. John, celebrated at 10 o'clock last Sunday morning in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery by the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester.

It was a beautiful morning for this solemn and beautiful service. An altar, covered with a white canopy, had been erected in one of the east valleys. Under the direction of a committee headed by Mrs. Theresa Ganster, the altar had been beautifully decorated with flowers.

Five hundred Knights of St. John, in full military uniform, with white plumed hats and glistening swords, marched at the head of the procession that escorted Bishop O'Hern and other officers of the Mass from the Mortuary Chapel to the altar. When near the altar the Knights formed an arch of swords, and beneath this the Bishop and priests walked to the altar. It was a most impressive spectacle. The officers of the Mass were as follows:

Very Rev. William M. Hart, V.G., assistant priest, deacon of honor, Rev. John P. Scheffhorn and Rev. John Leibert, C. S. R.; deacon of the Mass, Rev. John F. Boppel; subdeacon, Rev. J. Emil Gefeli; master of ceremonies, Rt. Rev. A. B. Meehan; second master of ceremonies, Rev. Arthur A. Hughes. The Knights of St. John choir and the Knights of Columbus Choral Society sang the Mass; their voices filling the cemetery with excellent harmony.

Commanderies of the Knights of St. John of Rochester. "Christian burial has been a solemn and sacred act performed by the Church in behalf of her departed from the very first days of Christianity, and it is altogether pleasing to God that we should show reverence to the mortal remains of those who have departed this life, possessed of the grace of God."

Temples of Holy Ghost "It is becoming that we should treat the human body with reverence and respect after death for during lifetime our bodies are the abode and instrument of the indwelling of the human soul made to the image and likeness of God, and therefore are sacred. They are temples of the Holy Ghost, and should be held in honor for God's sake."

"Moreover, Christian burial of the dead is a work of mercy which merits its own special reward. In the early days of Christianity, when persecutions raged, and men and women laid down their lives for the Faith, their brethren, men and women of the highest position, even Popes, did not hesitate to gather together the remains of the martyrs and to carry them in their arms to their last resting places in the Roman catacombs."

"Here the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass was offered up, and through this custom at a later period, the dead were buried often in the crypts of churches or in the little churchyard surrounding the church. "Today, practically every parish church has its own cemetery, and in the larger cities there are union or common cemeteries, such as this, where all the faithful are buried. "Holy Sepulchre was opened by the first bishop of Rochester in 1872, and the most careful planning was made by skilled architects for its future growth and development. Everything that human hands could devise in keeping with its nature and dignity was brought into play to beautify and enhance the dignity and sacredness of this burial plot consecrated to God. "To date, seventy thousand have been laid away on both sides of the cemetery, and the beautiful mortuary chapel, under which rests the body of the first bishop who conceived, planned and carried it out, was built and for all time will stand here as a testimonial to his sentiments and foresight in serving his diocese."

New Church Ready By September 15, Pastor Announces

The Rev. Charles J. Bruton, newly appointed pastor of the new parish of St. Margaret Mary, Rogers Parkway, has been busy the past few weeks organizing the parish and arranging for the construction of the temporary new church for his people. Ground was broken for the building this week, and a one-story frame structure, 48 by 100 feet, will be erected. It will seat 500 people, and will be completed and ready for use by September 15, Father Bruton expects. The altar will be stained shingles. Provision will be made for the choir, just inside the front vestibule and at the rear will be the main altar and two side altars with sanctuary and vestry on either side. More than six and one-half acres of ground have been acquired for the church property, and the new parish will have about 125 families at the start. Father Bruton's many friends will wish him the best of success in his work.
