

Important Announcements

At the conclusion of the Mass Bishop O'Hern delivered an address that was in excellent keeping with the spirit of the occasion. A brief history of the cemetery was part of the address, and this carried a special appeal to his listeners. Two important announcements were made by him.

First, that Holy Sepulchre Cemetery will be open for visits by automobiles on every day of the week except Saturdays, Sundays, legal-holidays and holydays of obligation, between the hours of 11 A. M. and 7 P. M.


Second, that a new and dignified entrance to the cemetery will soon be placed at Dewey Avenue, and that new burial plots will be opened on ans, the east and west sides of the ceme

tery. More than 70.000 people have been buried in the cemetery since it was opened by Bishop McQuaid in 1872, Bishop O'Hern said.

Bishop O'Hern's Address
