**Hibernians End Their Convention In Minneapolis**

Minneapolis, July 25.—Retreating the Ancient Order of Hibernians' approval of restrictive immigration "based upon common sense and justice to all racial strains," Michael Donahoe of Philadelphia, past National President, declared here at the 56th annual national convention that the organization will continue to place before Congress its opposition to the "National Origins" provision of the Immigration act, which he denounced as a fraud upon the people.

Judge Martin L. Sweeney of Cleveland was re-elected national president, Michael W. Delaney of Chicago vice-president, Patrick O'Donnell of Montreal national vice-president for Canada, P. J. Dwyer of Holyoke, Mass. secretary, Patrick Fitzgerald of Philadelphia treasurer, and Roderick J. Kennedy of New York City, John J. Jennings of Jersey City, Patrick J. Balkan, of Washington, D. C., James Kelly of Minneapolis, and Michael J. Connelly of New Haven, Conn., directors.

It was voted to hold the 1930 meeting of the Order in Newport, R. I.

One thousand delegates and two thousand other visitors are here for the convention of the Order and its Auxiliary, the first such gathering in Minnesota since the St. Paul Convention of 1886.

Outstanding projects discussed by the Hibernians were aid for the Irish College at Rome and further studies on the occasion of plays, motion pictures and books tending to depict Irish home life and the Catholic religion as degraded.

The Ladies' Auxiliary made plans for the formation of juvenile divisions and arranged for additional equipment for the Chapel of St. Ignace at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception at Washington.

**Audience to Seminarians**

The Pope last evening gave an audience to all waiting seminarians in the San Damaso Court yard. His arrival there was the signal for a fervent demonstration by the young clerics. The Palatine Guards Band played the Pontifical hymn and, once the Pope was seated, the seminarians, accompanied by the band, sang the "Hymn to Christ the King."

Ten Cardinals surrounded the head of the Church while he spoke to the young clerics, urging them not to confine their knowledge to ecclesiastical subjects but to branch out into all realms of thought because the day might come in which everything would be found useful for the efficacy of their ministry.

**Not Out of Vatican City**

While the Pope actually left the confines of the Vatican, he did not leave the territory of the Vatican City, but passed in procession over part of the Papal State recently created by the Concordat between the Vatican and the Italian Government. This did he and the seclusion that for 59 years characterized the lives of his predecessors in the Chair of Peter during that period, and thus did he put into practical effect the treaty which recognized the rights of the Pope and the existence of his own complete and full sovereignty within the limits of the state in which no spiritual or temporal power may be exercised save his own.

**Wisconsin Priest Gets U. S. Aviator's License**

Laona, Wis., July 25.—The Rev. Joseph C. Short, pastor of St. Leonard's church here, has been granted a private airplane pilot's license by the Federal authorities, becoming, it is said, Wisconsin's first flying priest.

Father Short, who is 53 years old, a chaplain on various United States ships during the War, and later was assigned to the Thirtieth Regiment, United States Marine Corps, with which he saw service overseas.

Burse To Educate Missioner Cincinnati, July 25.—More than a thousand dollars has been subscribed to a burse to educate a Passionist Missionary in memory of the Rev. Walter Coveyou, C.P., who was one of the three missionaries slain by bandits in China. The appeal was made by the Most Rev. John T. McNeill, Archbishop of Cincinnati. Father Walter was a native of this city.

**Charles House School Will Close Monday With Excellent Program**

More Than 300 Children Given Daily Instruction at This Summer School for Six Weeks—Excellent Work Done in All Departments

The summer school at the Charles Settlement House, which has been conducted daily for the past six weeks, will be brought to a close with appropriate exercises at 9:30 o'clock Monday morning, July 29. The closing program will include a recitation by the children, songs, the awarding of prizes for good work, perfect attendance and special classes, and demonstrations in kindergarten, handicraft and sewing work.

The school has been conducted under the capable direction of Miss Marion Burke, assisted by Miss Berntha Martens and Mrs. Henry Fairbanks, and with about 20 Nazareth College girls as teachers. More than 300 boys and girls have been present every day. Sessions were held from 9:30 to 11:45 each forenoon, and from 1 to 5:30 afternoons. The children were given religious instruction, and were taught sewing, singing, little Mother's work, little nurses' work, kindergarten, boy and girl Scout work, and they had library, story telling and recreation activities, as well as athletics in the parks and playgrounds. Splendid interest was shown in all these classes.

**Thos. E. Murray, Famous Inventor, Next to Edison**

Distinguished Catholic Citizen's Death Brings Out Important Facts About His Useful Life

Southampton, L. I., July 25.—An outstanding Catholic citizen, Thomas E. Murray, to whom, next to Thomas A. Edison, have been granted more patents than any inventor in the United States, and who was for many years in charge of all the allied Edison companies in New York and Brooklyn and of subsidiaries in Westchester County, died at his summer home, Wickapogue, Southampton, Sunday morning, after an illness of several months. Mr. Murray held patents on 1,100 inventions. He was sixty-nine years old.

Mr. Murray was active in religious work. He took a prominent part in the affairs of the Catholic Church. His activities were rewarded by his being made a member of the Knights of St. Gregory and of the Knights of Malta. He was one of the few persons in the United States appointed to have Mass celebrated in his own home, to maintain an altar there and to have the Blessed Sacrament in a private chapel in his home.

Honored for Safety Inventions

Although his early inventions were confined to the development of electrical and gas appliances, Mr. Murray's knowledge was so broad and his research studies so varied that his work has found its way into almost every modern industry.

His numerous inventions of safety appliances brought to him the Longstreth Medal of Merit from the Franklin Institute of Philadelphia. His method of welding shells, during the war and an invention which resulted in the manufacture of 240,000 lighter mortar shells brought him high commendation from the War Department.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday morning in St. Gregory's Church, Brooklyn. Mr. Murray is survived by eight children, Joseph, Daniel, Thomas E., Jr., Mrs. Katherine McQuill, Mrs. Anna McDonnell, Mrs. Julia Cuddihy, John F. and Mrs. Marie McDonnell.

**Charge of Heresy Flung at Bishop Stirs Anglicans**

London, July 25.—Another considerable stir in Anglican circles has been caused by Bishop Barnes of Birmingham through his assertion that belief in the occurrence of nature miracles is no longer tenable.

His principal Anglican opponent on this occasion is a prominent divine, Canon Carnegie. He charges the Bishop with heresy, for he states: "There can be no manner of doubt that the tenets which the Anglican Church indicates, and the acceptance of which she requires as a condition for her membership, include belief in the actual occurrence of at least one nature's miracle of a momentous character—Christ's bodily resurrection from the dead."

**Mexican Hierarchy To Issue Pastoral On Catholic Action**

Meeting of Ecclesiastical Authorities Soon to be Held for Purpose of Assigning Priests

Mexico City, July 25.—A pastoral in which instruction will be given to the clergy and laity of Mexico regarding the rules which are to govern Catholic Action under the present cordial relations is being prepared by the Hierarchy of Mexico. Announcement has just been made by the Most Rev. Pascual Diaz, Primate of Mexico, that a Committee of Bishops, now engaged in drafting the pastoral, also will inform the clergy and laity of the basis of a permanent religious accord now under discussion with the Secretary of Gobernacion.

Archbishop Diaz further announced that a meeting of the ecclesiastical authorities will be held within the next few days for the purpose of reorganizing and assigning the clergy to the churches.

As time passes worship is being re-organized throughout the land and it is expected that very shortly the Catholic religious life of Mexico will have assumed its normal conditions. Thousands of persons continue to visit the churches as an act of thanks to God for the settlement of the religious controversy.

**Jesuit Educator Died Suddenly**

New York, July 25.—Rev. John J. Lunny, S.J., professor of moral theology at the Jesuit House of Studies, Woodstock, Md., and moderator of theological conference for the archdiocese of New York, died suddenly of a heart attack Sunday. He was 59 years old.
