Mexican Hierarchy To Issue Pastoral **On Catholic Action**

Meeting of Ecclesiastical Authorities Soon to be Held for Purpose of Assigning Priests

Mexico City, July 25 .-- A pastoral in which instruction will be given to the clergy and laity of Mexico regarding the rules which are to govern Catholic Action under the present cordial relations is being prepared by the Hierarchy of Mexico. Announcement has just been made by the Most Rev. Pascual Diaz, Primate of Mexico, that a Committee of Bishops, now engaged in drafting the pastoral, also will inform the clergy and laity of the basis of a permanent religious accord now under discussion with the Secretary of Gobernacion.


Archbishop Diaz further announced that a meeting of the ecclesias-tical authorities will be held within the next few days for the purpose of clergy to the churches.
