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
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



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MASSES FOR WEEK

(The Gloria and Creed are not said, unless otherwise directed. There is only one oration (prayer) unless others are directed. The Preface is common unless another is directed.)

August 4. The eleventh Sunday after Pentecost. Green vestments. Mass is proper to the Sunday with the Gloria. The second prayer is a commemoration of St. Dominic. Preface of the Trinity.

August 5. Monday. Feast of the Dedication Church of St. Mary of the Snow. White vestments. The Mass is proper Gloria. Creed. Preface of the Blessed Virgin.

August 6. Tuesday. The Feast of the Transfiguration of Our Lord. White vestments. Mass is proper Gloria. Commemorate St. Sixtus. Creed. I preface of the Nativity.

August 7. Wednesday. Feast of St. Cajetan. White vestments. Mass is proper to the feast with the Gloria. The second prayer is of St. Donatus.

August 8. Thursday. Feast of St. Cyriacus and companions. Red vestments. Mass is proper with the Gloria. The second prayer is "Defend us." The priest may choose the third. A votive Mass is permitted.

August 9. Friday. The Vigil of St. Lawrence. Purple vestments. Mass is proper to the vigil. A commemoration is made of St. Romanus.

August 10. Saturday. Feast of St. Laurence. Red vestments. Mass is proper to the feast with the Gloria.

Governor Visits Catholic School At Cliff Haven

Was Greeted by 700 People, and
Introduced by Rev. Francis P.
Duffy, D.D.—Fifth Week of
the School

Cliff Haven, N. Y., Aug. 2.—Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt

was an unexpected but very welcome

visitor at the Catholic Summer

School here recently. He was warmly

greeted by 700 people on the

lawn in front of the main dining

hall. The Governor made an excep-

tion by coming to Cliff Haven. He

is not visiting any places but state

institutions. Introduced by Rev.

Francis P. Duffy, D.D., as "a great

Democrat in every sense of that

word" the Governor said that for

many years he had heard of the

splendid work being done at Cliff

Haven, and that he hoped to be able

to become better acquainted with it

next year, when he hopes to visit

the Catholic Summer School. When

informed that Fordham University

and the Catholic Summer School are

conducting university extension

classes here, he reminded Dr. Duffy

that he is an alumnus of Fordham

and proud to be one.

Sunday, August 4.—St. Dominic

founder of the Dominican Order. At

the age of twenty-five he was au-

prior of the Canons Regular of

Osma. He went to France with his

Bishop and there was much dis-

trress by the Albigensian heresy.

To defend the Faith he founded his

three-fold order. He died in 1221.

Monday, August 5.—The Dedica-

tion of St. Mary at Nives. This is

one of the three patriarchal churches

in Rome. It received its name from

the popular tradition that the site

was selected by the Blessed Virgin

who manifested her selection

through a snowfall which descended

upon the spot in the middle of the

summer.

Tuesday, August 6.—The Trans-

figuration of Our Lord. This feast

commemorates the time when Jesus

took St. Peter and the two sons of

Zebulon, Sts. James and John, and

led them to Mount Tabor where He

appeared to them in all His glory.

Wednesday, August 7.—St. Cajetan

was born at Vicenza in 1480, a pi-

ous and noble parent who dedi-

cated him to Our Blessed Lady. He

founded the first community of

regular Clerks, known as the

Theatines and was the first to intro-

duce the Forty Hours Adoration of

the Blessed Sacrament as an anti-

to the heresy of Calvin.

Thursday, August 8.—St. Cyriacus. Cyri-

acus was a holy deacon at Rome un-

til he was martyred.

Friday, August 9.—St. Lawrence.

Martyr, was a soldier in Rome at the

time of the martyrdom of St. Laurence.

Inspired by the latter's ex-

ample, he was converted and im-

prisoned by St. Laurence in prison.

When he publicly admitted what he

had done he was beheaded on the

day before the date set for the ex-
ecution of St. Laurence.

Saturday, August 10.—St. Laurence, Martyr, was the older among

the seven deacons of the Roman

Church. Roasted over a slow fire

because he refused to give up the

treasures of the Church he placed

as sport of his pain. At length

Christ, the Father of the poor, re-
solved him into eternal beatitudes.

\$100,000 Gift Made To Oil City Parish

OIL CITY, Aug. 2.—Two gifts

made to Rev. E. M. Driscoll, pastor

of St. Joseph's Church, here, by

Henry McSweeney, of Atlantic City,

N. J. The donations were made for

the erection of a high school in

memory of Mr. McSweeney's parents,

the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Mc-

Sweeney, pioneer members of the

parish.

Mr. McSweeney, who received his

primary education in St. Joseph's

parochial school, first presented

Father Driscoll with \$65,000 and

one week later added a second gift

of \$16,000.
