Governor Visits Catholic School At Cliff Haven

Was Greeted by 700 People, and Introduced by Rev. Francis P. Duffy, D.D.—Fifth Week of the School

Cliff Haven, N. Y., Aug. 2.—Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt was an unexpected but very welcome visitor at the Catholic Summer School here recently. He was warmly greeted by 700 people on the lawn in front of the main dining hall. The Governor made an exception by coming to Cliff Haven. He is not visiting any places but state institutions. Introduced by Rev. Francis P. Duffy, D.D., as "a great Democrat in every sense of that word" the Governor said that for many years he had heard of the splendid work being done at Cliff Haven, and that he hoped to be able to become better acquainted with it next year, when he hopes to visit the Catholic Summer School. When informed that Fordham University and the Catholic Summer School are conducting university extension classes here, he reminded Dr. Duffy that he is an alumnus of Fordham and proud to be one.

The fifth week of the Catholic Summer School season was marked with the success that has been apart from the opening of the 1929 program. A number of the students from the university extension group left, but a good percentage remained. There was a large influx of new guests over the last week end, and every cottage reports a record enrollment. During this week the 10 o'clock course of lectures was given by Rev. Michael Andrew Chapman, editor of the *Aeolus*, and associate editor of *Our Sunday Visitor*, from Huntington, Indiana. Father Chapman became a convert to Catholicism ten years ago, having

Sunday, August 4.—St. Dominic, founder of the Dominican Order. At the age of twenty-five, he was superior of the Canons Regular of Osma. He went to France with his Bishop and there was much distressed by the Albigensian heresy. To defend the Faith he founded his three-fold order. He died in 1221.

Monday, August 5.—The Dedication of St. Mary at Nives. This is one of the three patriarchal churches in Rome. It received its name from the popular tradition that the site was selected by the Blessed Virgin who manifested her selection through a snowfall which descended upon the spot in the middle of the summer.

Tuesday, August 6.—The Transfiguration of Our Lord. This feast commemorates the time when Jesus took St. Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, Sts. James and John, and led them to Mount Thabor where He appeared to them in all His glory.

Wednesday, August 7.—St. Cajetan was born at Viterbo in 1480 and was a pious and noble person who dedicated himself to Our Blessed Lady. He founded the first community of Regular Clerks, known as the Regulares, and was the first to introduce the Forty Hours Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament as an antidote to the heresy of Calvinism.

\$100,000 Gift Made To Oil City Parish

Oil City, Aug. 2.—Two gifts totaling \$100,000 have just been made to Rev. E. M. Driscoll, pastor of St. Joseph's Church, here, by Henry McSweney, of Atlantic City, N. J. The donations were made for the erection of a high school in memory of Mr. McSweney's parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph McSweney, pioneer members of the parish.

Mr. McSweney, who received his primary education in St. Joseph's parochial school, first presented Father Driscoll with \$55,000 last one week later added a second gift of \$45,000.

Where your house is to be built is almost as important as building it. The particular size of lot, with the particular frontage or natural advantages which you want may not be available to you for several reasons. The kind of neighborhood, the distance from transportation, the conditions of laying, sewer, gas and electricity, etc., are some of the things that will govern your selection of a home site. So we may pick out the place you want to build before you attempt to choose a house plan.

Having done that, and with the lot in mind, try to find a house that will fit it. If it is a narrow lot, then you must have a narrow house; if it is a shallow lot, then you must find a plan that is not too deep from the


front to back but that it will not merely go on your lot, but will leave a little room for a backyard and perhaps for a flower or vegetable garden. It is only by using a complete plan,

too, that you can get a definite estimate on the cost of building your home. All other figures are but guesses and it is dangerous to guess when building, no matter how experienced in building the guesser is.



As a suggestion to those who are contemplating building a home here is a small cottage which seems to typify a real spirit of home. Its story and a half construction has been designed to produce a charming outside appearance and the interior will be found equally satisfactory. The house is small, the dimensions being 20 feet by 26 feet, but it contains six good-sized rooms. The living room extends the depth of the house and is reached

front to back but that it will not merely go on your lot, but will leave a little room for a backyard and perhaps for a flower or vegetable garden. It is only by using a complete plan,

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through the covered entrance porch. It is 12 feet 6 inches wide and 10 feet long. At the front, to the left, with three windows at the front and one at the side, is the dining room 12 feet by 12 feet 6 inches. At the rear is the kitchen 12 feet square.

An open stairway leads from the rear of the living room to a central hall on the second floor, opening off which are three bedrooms and a bathroom.

The broken roof line of the living room with the dormer-like window gives it the appearance of a much larger house than it really is. It provides plenty of room for a most charming family and is of the type that is becoming more and more popular.
