ON REARING CHILDREN from CRIB TO COLLEGE

Physicians are pretty much in agreement as to how the baby should be dressed in his first year of life. The one general principle to be followed is that the amount of clothing he wears should correspond to the temperature and not to the season.

Children, it is true, resemble parents strongly. When we test the children, however young they may be, of lawyers, clerks, carpenters and day laborers, for instance, we find that these children on the whole arrange themselves in the same order as their fathers do, in response.

For the family with several growing children, and the overwhelming amount of laundry work which these can produce, the full-sized machine, designed for centrifugal drying, is a rock of strength in a weary land.
