Newly Decorated Sanctuary
Of St. Francis Xavier Church



The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, is expected to be present at the 9 o'clock Mass in St. Francis Xavier's Church Sunday morning. He will talk to the congregation at the Mass. The Rev. Francis X. Kunz, rector of the church, has had the church re-decorated throughout. A number of mural paintings are part of the decorative scheme, and the church interior is now one of the most attractive and inspiring in the city.

On August 21st Father Kunz will celebrate the 25th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. Bishop O'Hern and many priests of the Diocese will be present at this Mass. Father Kunz was ordained on June 11, 1904, but he postponed the celebration of the anniversary until the decorating of his church had been completed. He has been rector of St. Francis Xavier's Church for the past seven years. He is greatly beloved by his people, and has a great many friends who will congratulate him heartily and wish him many more years of useful and fruitful life in the priesthood.

Rev. Geo. V Burns Is Given a Purse By Parishioners

Rev. George V. Burns, rector of the Sacred Heart Church, arrived home from a trip to Europe last week-end on Friday evening was presented a substantial purse by his parishioners, as an expression of their esteem and of pleasure over his safe return home.

The exercises were held in the school hall, and they were largely attended. Under the direction of the Rev. George S. Hogan, assistant pastor of the church, an excellent program of entertainment was given. Father Burns gave an interesting account of his eight weeks' tour of Europe in company with Archbishop Thomas F. Hickey and the Rev. Dr. J. F. Goggin of St. Bernard's Seminary. He told how Archbishop Hickey walked close to the Pope in the great Eucharistic procession that marked the first appearance of the Pope outside of the Vatican walls in 59 years, and how he marched by the side of the Archbishop in that historic spectacle.

"One thing which impressed me especially," Father Burns said, "was the sight and sound of seminarians from every country in the world with all their variety of language, marching down the street singing the same hymn in their common language, Latin. There I saw complete international unity."

Father Gefell Memorial Mass In Cohocton

Celebrated Monday Morning by Brother of Deceased Pastor—Bishop O'Hern and a Number of Priests Took Part in Ceremony

A solemn high memorial Mass was celebrated in St. Pius' Church, Cohocton, at 10 o'clock Monday morning for the Rev. John F. Gefell, pastor of the church for 14 years, who died in Rochester on August 5th and was buried from Holy Family Church on August 9th. The church was filled with parishioners and friends of Father Gefell. All business places in Cohocton were closed during the hour of the funeral in tribute to the priest, who was greatly beloved by all the people of the community.

The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, and the Very Rev. William M. Hart, Vicar General of the Diocese, were present at the service. Bishop O'Hern officiated coram episcopo, and Father Hart was arch priest. The Rev. J. Emil Gefell, rector of St. Peter and Paul's Church, and another of the deceased priest, was celebrant of the Mass; Rev. F. William Stauder, deacon; Rev. William Frank, sub-deacon; Rev. Joseph Gefell, another brother of Father Gefell, and Rev. Arthur T. Florack were assistants to Bishop O'Hern; Rev. John J. Baker and Rev. George M. Kuhl, acolytes; Rev. Adalbert Schneider and Rev. Charles Riefer, censor bearers; Rev. William A. Doran, master-of-ceremonies.

Bishop O'Hern pronounced the final absolution at the end of the Mass and delivered an eloquent eulogy on the dead priest. He spoke on the dignity of the priesthood, and of the sacrifices made by the priest in his life and in his work.

"The influence of Father Gefell in this community has been a good influence," Bishop O'Hern said, "and I trust it will be a lasting influence. He lived and labored amongst the people of Cohocton for 14 years, doing God's work, teaching you the truths of Jesus Christ, and the love and service of God. This beautiful church is his monument here. It speaks for his zeal, and for his love and service of God. His last official act as pastor of this church was to rise from a sick bed and administer first Holy Communion to the children of this parish. Then he went to St. Mary's Hospital, Rochester, where for long hours of the day and nights for weeks he bore his sufferings patiently, and with resignation to God's holy will."

Bishop O'Hern urged the people to keep in memory the good work and the sacrifices of Father Gefell, and to pray for him often.

Funeral in Rochester
At the funeral of Father Gefell in the Holy Family Church more than 150 priests were present, many of them being from outside of the Diocese. Bishop O'Hern pontificated at the funeral Mass.

Rev. Joseph H. Gefell, brother of the dead priest and pastor of Holy Family Church, was sub-deacon. Rev. J. Emil Gefell, another brother, pastor of St. Peter and Paul's Church, served as an assistant priest. Rev. John F. Boppel was deacon of the Mass; Rt. Rev. Magr. Andrew B. Meenan, master of ceremonies; Rev. William Bergin, assistant; Rev. J. B. Sullivan and Rev. J. Weismantel, were acolytes; Rev. F. W. Stauder, book bearer; Rev. Charles F. Shay, candle bearer; Rev. Arthur Florack, miter bearer; Rev. Walter Foery, censor bearer.

The Rt. Rev. Magr. James J. Hartley of St. Bernard's Seminary and the Rt. Rev. Magr. James McGlin of Buffalo were among the priests in the sanctuary.

The bearers were: Rev. F. William Stauder, Rev. Arthur Florack, Rev. Walter Foery, Rev. John Sullivan, Rev. John Weismantel and Rev. William Frank.

Bishop O'Hern's eulogy was a beautiful tribute to the dead priest. He spoke of his long years of service at the altar of God, of his faithful work, of the fidelity of his priestly character, and concluded as follows:

"We lay him away close to the bishop who ordained him, close to his brother priests, close to the members of those parishes who have gone before and ask God to have mercy upon his soul. May his good deeds of a true and priestly life be found awaiting him on the foreign shore, and may the words of the Master Whom he served so well be uttered in the presence of angelic choirs: 'Well done, thou good and faithful servant, enter into the joy of thy Lord.'"
