Famous Professor of Gregorian Chant Joins C. U. Faculty

Washington, Aug. 30.—Don Maur Sablayrolles, O.S.B., of France, regarded as one of the finest artists of the Gregorian Restoration, this year will join the staff of the Catholic University of America School of Gregorian Chant, the Rt. Rev. Magr. James H. Ryan, Rector of the University, just announced.

In addition to his work as a writer, the Benedictine has added the direct and personal apostolate of teacher-public lecturer and visitor to the various seminaries and religious communities, Liturgical Congresses and "Gregorian Days," which are being generally organized in Europe. His activities as a teacher have spread as far as Spain, Switzerland and all over France. In 1905, with another Benedictine monk, he made a study of the musical manuscripts of the Spanish libraries and brought 6,000 photographs as his personal contribution toward the work of preparing the Vatican edition.

One of the effects of Don Maur Sablayrolles' many years of teaching in Paris was the creation of Institut Gregorian, a school founded with the express purpose of forming good teachers of the Liturgical Chant. He is on the honorary committee of the Institut, and last year had charge of the great celebration of Chartres Cathedral, where he directed 500 choristers.

Rev. John J. O'Byrne Is New President of Niagara Univ.

Very Rev. John J. O'Byrne, C.M., president of the Preparatory College of the Vincentian Fathers at Princeton, N. J., has been appointed President of Niagara University, to succeed Very Rev. Francis J. Dodd, C.M., who is transferred to Emmetsburg, Md., become assistant director of the Sisters of Charity of the Eastern Province.

Father O'Byrne is no stranger at Niagara. For 12 years he was prefect of discipline in the college department. In 1916 he was appointed treasurer of the university, which position he held until his transfer to St. John's College, Brooklyn, in 1919.

After teaching at Brooklyn for several years he was named president of St. Joseph's College, Princeton, N. J., where he has been for the last three years. His 17 years at Niagara as a teacher and executive have made him a well-known figure in Western New York and the alumni

and friends of Niagara will welcome him to his new position as president of the university.

James Fitzgerald, C.M., from Brooklyn to Niagara; Rev. Joseph Becker, C.M., from St. Vincent's Seminary, Germantown, to Niagara; Rev. John W. Dunn, C.M., from Niagara to Brooklyn.

Mabel Is Sued For One Million By St. Louis Dry

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 30.—Gus O. Nations, former chief of the St. Louis Federal Prohibition Unit here, has sued Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt, former assistant United States attorney-general, and the Current News Features Company for \$1,000,000 libel.

Under garnishment proceedings Nations has tied up funds due the feature service and Mrs. Willebrandt from the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, which has published her articles on prohibition and enforcement. Nations charges the articles were intended to make the public understand that he while in office had been guilty of official misconduct. Nations quotes from two of Mrs. Willebrandt's articles to substantiate his claims.

Troubles, Troubles, Troubles

Mrs. Willebrandt's articles on "The Inside of Prohibition" are causing no end of troubles. Her recent statement that Attorney James Francis Burke of Pittsburgh, Pa., counsel of the Republican National Committee, and a prominent Catholic, had carefully edited and approved the famous speech he delivered to 2,500 Methodist ministers in Ohio, during the recent presidential campaign, met with a sharp denial from Mr. Burke. He called her statement unqualifiedly false. Mrs. Willebrandt, in that speech, asked the ministers to go back home and use their pulpits to defeat Al. Smith.

Several other upsets have followed the publication of her articles, including one by F. Scott McBride of the Anti-Saloon League, who pulled a whole handful of hair out of Mabel's head, metaphorically speaking.

The suit for \$1,000,000 is the result of a statement by Mrs. Willebrandt that Gus Nations, while heading the Prohibition unit in his state, conspired with a brewery and aided that brewery to sell its beer.

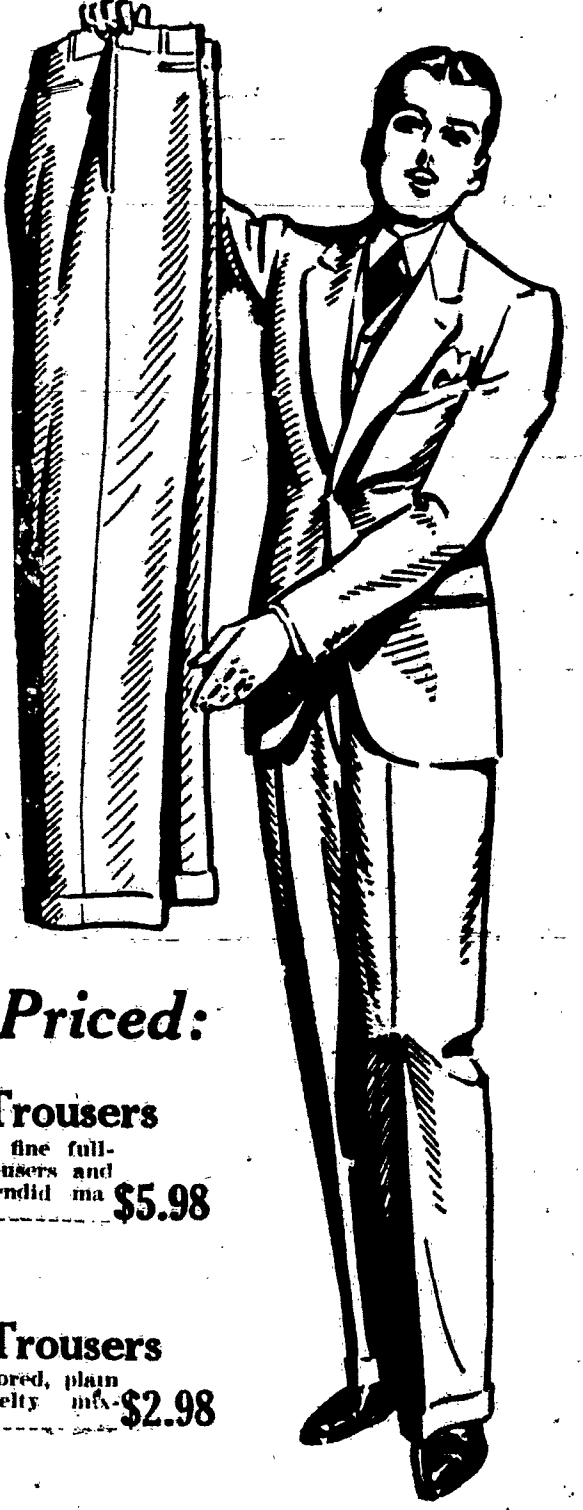
