Rev. John J. McGrath Will Soon Celebrate His 40th Anniversary

Pastor of St. Mary's Church, Auburn, Forty Years a Priest, Will Observe Event on September 22d—Bishop O'Hern Expected to Take Part

Auburn, Aug. 30.—The Rev. John J. McGrath, rector of St. Mary's Church, Auburn, will celebrate the 40th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood on Sunday, September 22d. The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, was at one time an assistant priest in St. Mary's Church, and it is expected that he will come to Auburn and take part in Father McGrath's jubilee celebration.

Father McGrath attended Troy Seminary and was ordained September 21, 1889 by Rt. Rev. Bernard McQuaid, bishop of the diocese of Rochester. His first assignment was assistant at the Cathedral at Rochester. He was then appointed assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church in Auburn, serving under the late Rev. William Mulhern. He was then appointed pastor of St. Patrick's Church in Moravia, where he served five years.

Father McGrath later was made pastor of St. Aloysius' Church in Auburn, organized in 1901. During his service for that parish a church and school was built and a parish hall erected in Wall Street. On the death of Rev. William Payno, pastor of St. Mary's Church, about a decade ago, Father McGrath was appointed pastor of the church.

During his regime as pastor of St. Mary's Church, Father McGrath has remodeled the parochial residence and the church school in Clark Street. A set of chimneys, which he selected, has been installed in the church tower and the interior of the church edifice, one of the finest architecturally in this section has been redecorated and beautified.

The church membership has been increased and the activities of the various societies expanded. Father McGrath, in addition to his church duties, has charge of the church convent in Clark Street, located on the site of the old Barber estate and also of Mercy Hospital in southwest Auburn. He took an active part in the recent successful financial campaign to raise a half million dollars for a new and modern Mercy Hospital.

Dr. Moore is still active and energetic in his work. A true priest, zealous, self-sacrificing, and helpful in every possible way to his people, he is greatly beloved in his parish and throughout the city of Auburn. Hundreds of friends will felicitate him on the coming anniversary, and will wish him many more years of splendid work for his Church and for God.

SENECA FALLS Bishop Will Celebrate The Centennial of New York

Important Event Will Be Observed Next Month—Work Progressing Rapidly on New Church

Seneca Falls, Aug. 30.—The Rev. John Francis O'Hern, Bishop of Rochester, will celebrate the centennial of the new St. Patrick's Church in this village on September 22d. Preparatory work on the new edifice is progressing rapidly, with Rev. James J. Conroy as general contractor.

The parochial residence has been built on a new site southwest of its former location, making room for the new church. The new church will be 100 feet long from north to south, and measuring 90 feet east and west, according to plans drawn by the late Rev. Joseph P. Ryan of Seneca Falls. The new church will be a Gothic Revival style, and will be surrounded by a tower 70 feet high, over which will be a cross of stone. The communion rail will be 10 feet long. A total of 750 persons may be seated at the altar, and the seating capacity of the church will be 1,000. The new church will be a pipe organ and will be transferred to the new church.
