How to Vote in Non-Partisan Primaries

- 1 If you registered last year, regardless of whether you enrolled in a party, you can vote in the non-partisan primaries.
- 2 When you enter the election booth, simply give your name and address and say: "I want to vote in the non-partisan primaries."
- 3 The inspector will give you a folded ballot which, when unfolded, will look like the sample ballot printed below.
- 4 Use the pencil you find inside the voting booth. Mark an X INSIDE the squares opposite the names of five candidates. Be sure the cross X mark is wholly within the square as shown below.
- 5 If you want to change your ballot after marking, do not erase the first mark nor deface ballot in any manner. Simply ask for a new ballot.
- 6 Fold the ballot and hand it to the inspector.
- 7 By marking the ballot as shown below—with an X opposite the names of ADLER, FLYNN, GOODWIN, STANTON and WILSON—you will vote to keep City Manager Government in the hands of its friends and out of the hands of those who would use the charter for political purposes.

IN ORDER TO VOTE THE VOTER SHOULD MAKE WITH A LEAD PENCIL, HAVING BLACK LEAD A CROSS X MARK IN THE VOTING SPACE AT THE LEFT OF THE NAME OF THE CANDIDATE OR CANDIDATES FOR WHOM HE DESIRES TO VOTE.

TO VOTE FOR A PERSON WHOSE NAME IS NOT ON THE BALLOT, WRITE THE NAME OF SUCH PERSON UNDER THE TITLE OF THE OFFICE IN THE BLANK SPACE PROVIDED FOR THAT PURPOSE.

ANY OTHER MARK THAN THE CROSS X MARK USED FOR THE PURPOSE OF VOTING OR ANY ERASURE MADE ON THIS BALLOT MAKES IT VOID, AND IT CANNOT BE COUNTED AS A VOTE FOR ANY CANDIDATE.

IF YOU TEAR OR DEFACE OR WRONGLY MARK THE BALLOT, RETURN IT AND OBTAIN ANOTHER, BUT ONLY ONE SUCH ADDITIONAL BALLOT MAY BE SO OBTAINED.

Pioneer Sister Was Active Here For 55 Years

Sister Mary Berchmans Frison, pioneer member of the Sisterhood of St. Joseph in this city, died at Nazareth Convent, Pittsford, on Thursday, September 5 and was buried from the convent chapel on Saturday morning. For 55 years she had been a zealous worker in this Diocese, a beloved and capable educator for much of that time, and one whose kindly ways endeared her to the hearts of hundreds of students and fellow Sisters.

Sister Mary Berchmans came to Rochester from Belgium in 1874, on the invitation of the late Magr. De Regge, then the Chancellor of the Diocese. She was educated in the celebrated Normal School of Bruges, Belgium, and her splendid training and outstanding ability made her a powerful factor for good in the up-building of the great education system of the Sisters of St. Joseph in this Diocese. She exerted a fine influence upon all with whom she came in contact, both in general educational methods and in the teaching of languages. Her Lectures Faciens published in 1876, is a valuable introduction to the study of French literature.

Sister M. Marcella, principal of Nazareth Academy, and long a co-worker with Sister Mary Berchmans, said of her:

"Sister Berchmans' name will long be held in veneration by members of the Sisters of St. Joseph and earlier alumnae of Nazareth Academy, who revered her as a devoted teacher and friend. Sister Berchmans became one of the most potent factors in general educational methods and teaching of languages in the diocese. She collected historical data that has since been embodied in 'Community Annals,' now in preparation for publication.

The funeral of Sister Mary Berchmans was attended by members of the Sisterhood and by earlier alumnae of Nazareth Academy, who revered her as devoted teacher and friend.

Rev. Howard M. Geck, chaplain at the convent, celebrated the solemn high mass of requiem, assisted by Rt. Rev. Magr. Michael J. Nolan as deacon and Rev. William J. Naughton as subdeacon. Rev. Camille A. van der Meulen acted as master of ceremonies. The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, Bishop of the Diocese, delivered the final blessing. Interment was in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in the private plot reserved for Sisters.

St. Andrew House Was Inspected By Many Visitors

The St. Andrew House, 46 Greig Street, was inspected by many visitors last Sunday and its conveniences were greatly admired. The St. Andrew House will be the home of non-resident students of St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary, and the Rev. Edward M. Lyons, formerly assistant pastor of St. Augustine's Church, will be the director of the house. There are accommodations for 30 students at the house. Visitors admired the chapel that has been fitted up on the second floor, the large living room, the refectory, study rooms, etc., and found the house a most suitable place for its purposes.

Many visitors brought donations of canned goods, etc., to the house for the boys. Others gave cash donations. Donations of any helpful nature will be gladly received at the home, and it is the hope of Father Lyons that many people will take an interest in this home, in the boys who live there during the school year, and in the good work that will be accomplished there for future priests of the Diocese.

Various Requests Made to Charity by Elizabeth Schmid

The will of Miss Elizabeth Schmid, admitted to probate this week, left an estate of \$3,200 to various charities, except for a few minor bequests.

Specific amounts are bequeathed as follows: St. Joseph's Orphan Asylum, \$600; Sacred Heart Altar Society of St. Joseph's Church, \$300; Missionary Society of the Most Holy Redeemer, Brooklyn, \$300; Sister Theodora, a niece, \$100; Rev. John M. Fetter, nephew of St. Bernard's Seminary, \$150; St. Joseph's Church, for masses, \$500. The residue is to be divided among the beneficiaries.

Priest Who Wrote Religious History Of Japan, Is Dead

Tokyo, Japan, Sept. 13.—A Catholic missionary who was a distinguished scholar of Japanese history, died recently at Tokyo. This was Father M. Steichen of the Paris Foreign Mission Society. He was seventy-two years of age, and had spent the greater part of his life in Japan.

His book, entitled, "The Christian Daimyos" is an abridgment of the religious and political history of Japan from 1549, the date of the introduction of Christianity into that country, to 1650, when all traces of the Christian religion were thought to have been wiped out.

Father Steichen's book has been used as an authoritative source by leading Japanese scholars. It has been published in Japanese, French, German, and English.

About 50 nurses of St. Mary's Hospital staff enjoyed a picnic at the St. Mary Hospital farm, just off the Chili road, on Wednesday of this week.
