12,000 In Tolerance March In Baltimore Society Is Formed

Baltimore, Sept. 20.—A parade of 12,000 members of Catholic, Jewish and Protestant fraternal orders, held here Friday evening, featured Baltimore's bi-centenary celebration, which stressed the idea of religious tolerance.

The Knights of Columbus marched 2,000 strong. Other fraternal orders represented were the Masons, the Odd Fellows, the Junior Order of United Mechanics, the Ancient Order of Hibernians, the B'nai B'rith and other Jewish orders, the Improved Order of Red Men, the Elks and the Loyal Order of Moose.

Following the parade, a permanent non-sectarian body was formed, in which every fraternal order in Baltimore is represented, except the Koo Koo K. The purpose of the organization, according to J. Albert Casserly, who was chosen first president, "is to bring mankind together in a clear bond of friendship and brotherly love, without regard to religion or politics."

At the conclusion of the meeting, the Tall Cedars of Lebanon, affiliated with Masonry, invited all the organizations to a general fraternity dinner to outline further plans for the new organization. Among other officers to be selected from affiliated organizations, the name of Robert A. Sindall, Potentate of the Shriners, and Dr. John J. McGinty, of the Knights of Columbus, have been mentioned.
