**Rev. Bob Shuler
 Faces Contempt
 Charge on Coast**

Los Angeles, Oct. 4.—The Rev. Robert P. ("Bob") Shuler, noted for his bigoted attacks on the Catholic Church and the Knights of Columbus, has been cited for contempt of court here in connection with his statement, made through his own radio station, that the jury hearing the case of Mrs. Lois Pantages was "fixed."

The Rev. Mr. Shuler was cited along with the Rev. Gustav A. Briegleb, pastor of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church here.

Both are accused of having circulated the statement that the "Pantages case jury was hung before a line of testimony was taken," and the further statement by the Rev. Mr. Shuler that he could "name the man who will hang it."

Mrs. Pantages was found guilty of manslaughter, in connection with the death in an auto crash of a Japanese farmer.

In addition to the action of Judge Robert Hardy, who cited the two ministers, the statements concerning the Pantages case drew fire from the Bar Association and the grand jury. The latter body characterized the Rev. Mr. Shuler as "a disseminator of gossip, superficial inquiry and vague suspicion," and rebuked him for taking advantage of his position as pastor of Trinity Methodist Church to spread his unfounded accusations.

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
