Attractive Home That Provides Ample Room for Average Family

Here we have a story-and-a-half home made larger by a dormer projection. The porch and the living room will appeal to those who want comfort, light and ventilation. The home is 21 feet wide and 28 feet deep and contains six rooms.

When the Dutch settled on Manhattan Island and in the adjacent territory more than three hundred years ago, they brought with them some unusual ideas in home building, and the Dutch homes built in New York have still their influence on the architecture of the whole United States. The Dutch colonial home is very popular and houses following the original Dutch plan with many minor changes are being built today everywhere.

The Dutch colonial R. A. was dormer set into a steep pitched roof. Such dormers allow rooms of full height on the second floor of what otherwise would be a two-story house.

First Floor Plan.

The building itself is 28 feet long by 21 feet deep. The entrance on one side of the front leads directly into a living room, 14 feet by 10 feet. A casual opening connects the living room with the dining room the walls of which extend out part way of the width of the open porch. At the rear on the corner is the kitchen.

Stairs run out of the dining room to the second floor where there are three bedrooms, each a corner room, and a bathroom.

For prospective home builders who want a rather unusual design for their homes, this plan will appeal. The home is not high in cost but is attractive and provides ample room for a medium-sized family. It is of frame construction and has a basement of the same dimension and lines as the foundation walls.
