### MISSION SUNDAY

Sunday, October 20, has been designated as MISSION SUNDAY by our Holy Father, the Pope. In all churches throughout the world the priests of our Church will talk on the Missions that day. On the following Sunday, October 27, collections will be taken up to help support the Missions; to help keep the great work of Propagation of the Faith alive, active, alert, and make it successful in reclaiming souls for Jesus Christ.

Two-thirds of the people of the world are still Pagan—400 millions in China, 300 millions in India, 200 millions in Africa, 70 millions in Japan, 30 millions in other countries. In all of these countries Catholic Missions have been established by heroic Sisters, Brothers, Priests and Prelates. Thousands of converts are being made each year—and each year new Martyrs give their blood and their lives for the Faith.

### GENEVA

#### Thomas M. Rogan, Clothing Dealer, Died Suddenly

Geneva, Oct. 18.—Thomas M. Rogan, aged 48 years, member of the clothing firm of Rogan & Johnson, was found dead in the kitchen of his home Monday morning by his son-in-law, Russell Morton. His funeral was held at the Church of St. Francis de Sales on Wednesday morning, and was largely attended.

Mr. Rogan was alone in the house at the time of his death, his relatives having come on an auto trip to New York. When he failed to go to his store Monday morning, his son-in-law, who had spent Saturday and Sunday at the Seneca Hotel with his father, went to the home and found him dead.

An autopsy performed showed death to be due to acute dilation of the heart. Mr. Rogan leaves a daughter, Mrs. Russell Morton; his mother, Mrs. Ann Rogan; two brothers, John of Leonia, N. J., and James Rogan of Fairport, and two sisters, Miss Mary Rogan and Mrs. William J. Harding of Geneva.

#### K. of C. Degree Drew Big Crowd Last Sunday

Canandaigua, Oct. 18.—Several hundred Knights of Columbus attended the exemplification of the Third Degree of the order here last Sunday by State Deputy Walter A. Lynch of New York City and his team. His body arrived in Auburn Wednesday this week in charge of Undertaker Joseph E. Heiseck and was taken to the home of Mrs. Vatter, 26 Walnut Street. The funeral was held Thursday morning in St. Mary's Church at 9:30 o'clock. Interment in St. Joseph's Cemetery.
