## Campaign for \$10,000 Offers Opportunities to Many Men and Women; Apostolate of Laity Urged by Cincinnati Prelate at Fort Wayne

### Prizes for Members Include \$2,000 Cash And Four Fine Autos

Actual Start Made This Week, But Field Is Still Open for Many New Members, with Rich Prizes in Sight—How to Win Some of the Finest Prizes Ever Offered by a Catholic Newspaper

#### NAMES AND STANDING OF THE MEMBERS WHO HAVE COMMENCED GETTING RESULTS

The Catholic Courier and Journal subscription campaign starts in earnest with a publication this week of the first list of active members. While a number of other names have been received from persons anxious to join and from friends who sent in suggestions, only a comparatively few have actually made a start in the campaign.

The list we publish today contains only the names of those who have earned in at least one subscription up to 10 o'clock Thursday morning. The names of all new active members will be published next week and in subsequent issues. The only thing now needed to make the subscription campaign a success is a larger number of active members and it is hoped that next week's list will show a big increase in membership as there is lots of room in every district for many more enrollments.

Listed by Districts

Members of the Subscription Club are listed according to the districts in which they reside—but this does not mean that they are limited to gathering subscription votes in their immediate districts. On the contrary, subscriptions may be taken anywhere—thus members who have friends living out of town can have

these friends assist them just the same as they may ask their next door neighbor for a subscription.

The division by districts is simply for the purpose of distributing the \$10,000 cash prizes. ### Mission Sunday Guests at the Cathedral

Priests in the sanctuary included the Rev. Msgr. James Hartley, Rev. Bernard Gaffell, Rev. Edward Lyons, Rev. John McMahon, and Rt. Rev. Msgr. Michael J. Nolan.

Music of the Mass was sung by the men's choir under the direction of Prof. F. Eugene Bonn, Cathedral choirmaster, and students of St. Andrew's Seminary, under direction of Rev. Benedict Egan, assistant at St. Patrick's and a member of the faculty of St. Andrew's.

Bishop Walsh preached a masterful sermon, in which he pointed out the great need for missions, both in America and abroad. He gave statistics showing the great number of mission workers, the good they have done, the converts they have made, and he told of the importance of keeping up this work for the Church and for God. In closing he said: "Today, my dear brethren, the Church is rallying her children to support her in her mission to all peoples. Today, she is asking you, alms and your prayers for the conversion of the world. With a mixed tone of command and appeal, she summons her children to that infectious holiness of life by which they realize Christ's simile of the leaven that will leaven the whole mass of her fellows in the world."

The service was attended by a capacity congregation, and many other thousands of people heard it by Radio, were inspired by the beauty and appeal of it all, and were most appreciative of the privilege they enjoyed.

Bishop O'Hern Grateful

Bishop O'Hern spoke at the conclusion of the service, and expressed his appreciation of the splendid sermon by Bishop Walsh; paid sincere tribute to the Very Rev. James A. Walsh for his great work at Margnyville; thanked Dr. Nixon for his kindness in releasing the Radio service to the Cathedral, and expressed his good will and good wishes to all people, including "our beloved non-Catholic friends." It was a splendid close to a splendid service.

### Object Is Spiritual, And the World Needs Catholic Lay Action

Archbishop McNicholas, in Sermon at Opening of National Council Convention at Fort Wayne, Says Pope Pius XI Is Calling Church Back to Apostolate of Laity in Labor of Clergy

#### STRONG APPEAL MADE TO MEN TO UNITE FOR NATIONAL AND RELIGIOUS INTERESTS

Fort Wayne, Ind., Oct. 25.—In a sermon which called for the laity's participation in the Apostolate of the Hierarchy, the Most Rev. John T. McNicholas, O.P., Archbishop of Cincinnati, sounded the keynote of the annual convention of the National Council of Catholic Men at its opening with a Pontifical High Mass in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception here Sunday morning.

The same chord was struck by the Rt. Rev. Joseph Schrembs, Bishop of Cleveland and Episcopal Chairman of the Department of Lay Organizations, N.C.W.C., the Rev. J. M. Lonergan, past National Chairman of the American Legion, and Quin O'Brien of Chicago, in their addresses to the mass meeting of some two thousand men and women in the Shrine's auditorium Sunday afternoon.

Laity Called to Active Work

"Just as Pope Pius called back the Universal Church to the Apostolate practice of frequent and daily Communion, even for little ones," said Archbishop McNicholas in his sermon. "The Pope calls for the universal participation of the laity in the labors of the Church and priests of the Sovereign Pontiff."

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### Mt. Carmel Cornerstone Laid on Sunday Afternoon Before Great Congregation

Bishop O'Hern officiated, Bishop Walsh of Charleston, S. C., and Rev. Walter A. Foery, Rector, Gave Gracious Talk

Last Sunday was a big day for priests and people of the Mt. Carmel parish—one of the happiest days in their history. The cornerstone of the fine new church now under construction, was laid in the afternoon by the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, and a congregation of more than 2,000 people assembled to witness the impressive ceremony.

Bishop O'Hern was assisted by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, Y.G.; Rev. Walter A. Foery, rector of the church, and Rev. Patrick Kofal, Rev. Joseph D'Isidoro, and Rev. Gerald Brennan, three assistant pastors. The ceremony took place on a platform decked with American and Italian flags and with panel colors. A large number of priests attended.

Bishop O'Hern spoke to the people in Italian. He reminded them that one of the first official tasks of his predecessor, the Most Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, D.D., when he became

Bishop of Rochester, was to lay the cornerstone of the present Mt. Carmel Church, and that this was the first church cornerstone he himself was laying as Bishop of Rochester. Bishop O'Hern's talk won the hearts of all the people.

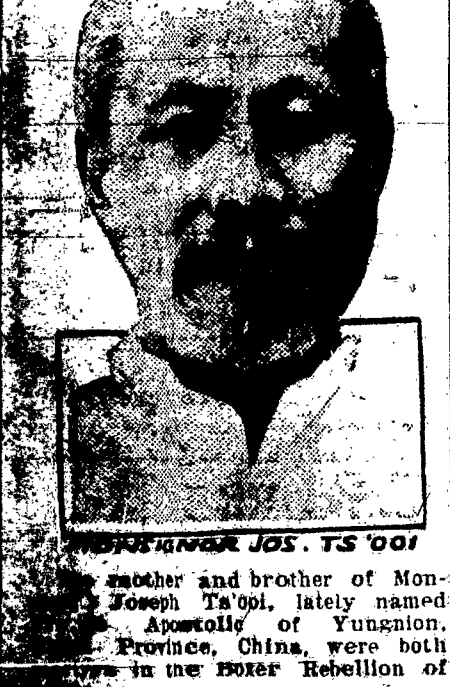
The Rt. Rev. Emmett M. Walsh, D.D., Bishop of Charleston, S. C., spoke in English, and was heard with great appreciation. He congratulated priests and people on the new church, on the spirit which has made it possible, and expressed the hope that it will help strengthen their faith and loyalty to the Church, God's great gift to mankind.

The Rev. Walter A. Foery, rector of the church, spoke happily to the assembled priests, people and people, and paid sincere tribute to Bishop O'Hern and to the loyal generosity of his people.

At the conclusion of the service, Bishop O'Hern was escorted by Father Foery to two invalids of the parish, Mrs. Mary Doyle and Mrs. Elizabeth Brizandi, seated on the edge of the crowd, who received the Bishop's blessing.

On the platform during the services were Rev. Eugene Golding, Rev. Bernard Gaffell, Rev. George Schmidt, Rev. Francis Luddy, Rev. Leo Mooney, Rev. A. Gabbani, Rev. Benedict Maselli, Rev. John Duffy and the two trustees of the church, Charles Dispensa and Dr. Joseph Inavolo.

### Total Abstinence League Needed Now More Than Ever Says Cardinal Dougherty

#### Philadelphia Archbishop Urges Formation of Branches of Catholic Total Abstinence Union, Especially For the Young

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 25.—At the annual convention of the Illinois-Kansas-Missouri Ladies' Auxiliary, Knights of Father Matthew, in session here this week, a letter was read from Cardinal Dougherty, Archbishop of Philadelphia, declaring that the Prohibition law has increased the need of temperance societies. The letter said in part: "With the advent of the Eighteenth Amendment to the Constitution and the enactment of the Volstead law, it generally was thought that there would be no further need for Catholic Total Abstinence League of America.

"Experience has shown that there is more need of it now than ever before. According to statistics, the drink evil has not only not ceased, but it seems to have increased, and with the increase in drink has come an increase in crime.

"There is a great urgent need of a revival and spread of the Catholic Total Abstinence Union all over the United States. It will be well for the faith and morals of our people, especially for the young, if they become members of the union."

### Children Sing the Ordinary of Mass In Winnipeg, Can.

Winnipeg, Man., Canada, Oct. 25. Children of St. Mary's Cathedral School sang the Ordinary of the 9 o'clock Mass here recently, under a new plan inaugurated by the Most Rev. Alfred A. Sinnott, Archbishop of Winnipeg, whereby the children will be made more familiar with the music of the Mass.

The new plan was put into effect for the first time October 6, when the children, grouped in the center aisles of the Cathedral, sang all the responses and the parts of the Communion of the Mass usually sung by the choir. The effect was highly impressive, the voices of the boys and girls rising in solemn melody as the Mass progressed.

### Investiture of Msgr. Hart An Impressive Ceremony In Corpus Christi Church

One Archbishop, Two Bishops, Many Priests, Members of Sisterhood and Great Congregation of Laity Attended the Service

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, S.T.L., Ph.D., Vicar General of the Diocese of Rochester, was elevated to the high rank of Domestic Prelate of the Church, with the title of Monsignor, at a solemn and beautiful ceremony in Corpus Christi Church on Wednesday morning this week. It was an impressive occasion, and certainly a most happy one, for Msgr. Hart, and it could not help but bring home to him a full appreciation of the fine love and esteem in which he is held by his Bishop, brother priests and the laity of the Diocese of Rochester. The great audience of priests, members of the various Sisterhoods, and of the laity, present at the investiture, was splendid evidence of that.

One Archbishop—the Most Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, D.D.—and two Bishops—the Rt. Rev. John P. Brophy, O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, and the Rt. Rev. Emmett M. Walsh, D.D., Bishop of Charleston, S. C.—honored Msgr. Hart by their presence, and there were three Monsignori and more than 100 priests in attendance.

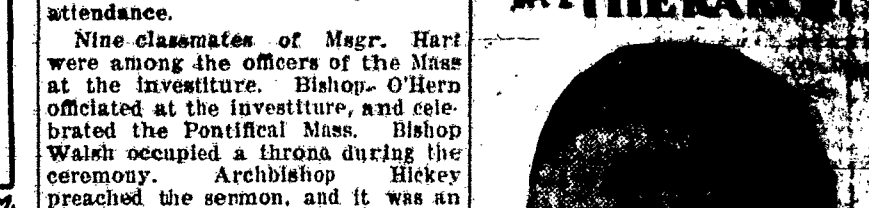

### Arab Enrolls At Notre Dame For Law Course

South Bend, Ind., Oct. 25.—Aziz Saliba El-Aral, 28, a Christian Arab, has enrolled at Notre Dame University Law School here. He plans to complete his legal education in five years of study and return to Palestine and the trans-Jordanic territory, to carry on the work of Christian education.

Aral's trunks are filled with Oriental and European rugs and tapestries, Egyptian gilt tablecloths, Persian silk fancy work, and other choice handmade pieces, which he expects to dispose of to defray his student expenses.

### India Moves To End Child Marriage Evil

London, Oct. 25.—The Government of India has at last consented to support a bill in the Indian Legislative Assembly punishing the consummation of marriage with a girl under 15 years of age, and social reformers see the move the first step in a widespread correction of the child marriage evil.

The projected bill provides for punishment of all major parties in the marriage contract, including relatives and guardians of the girl. It makes a marriage contract a punishable offense if the girl is under 14, and provides long term imprisonment for persons consummating a marriage with a girl of less than 12.
