Rural Bigotry Must Be Fought By Education

Des Moines, Ia., Oct. 25.—The extent of religious intolerance and prejudice against the Church in rural communities, and means to be used in combating it, formed the major discussion at the Seventh Annual meeting, National Catholic Rural Life Conference, which closed here last week.
 An entire session was given over to an analysis of the questionnaire sent out by the president of the conference, the Rev. W. Howard Bishop, seeking remedies to present prejudice and antagonism against Catholics in the rural communities of the country. The suggestions given by the many clergymen and editors to whom the questionnaire was sent ranged over a wide area. Among the means proposed to rectify the condition were: Dissemination of truth through literature and lectures on doctrinal subjects; both Catholics and non-Catholics; joint preaching; radio talks; participation in civic affairs; and regular sermons to be preached by priests and seminarians, in addition to their regular summer vacation school work.
 John P. Boland, co-founder of the Catholic Evidence Guild of England, told the delegates that education has been one of the principal factors in defeating bigotry in Great Britain, and urged his hearers to concentrate on an extensive educational campaign.
 "The meeting drew the largest attendance of priests and laymen in history. Officers all were re-elected at today's session."
