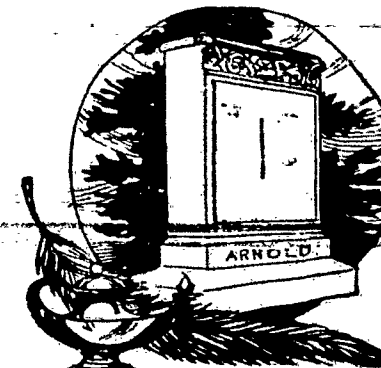

On her first trip to this country in 1921 she was also presented with a gram of radium. This was presented to her so that she might carry on her investigations, because it was found that this woman who had done so much for the good of mankind, had scarcely enough material to carry out her experiments and many people were glad to contribute to this gift so that she might continue the investigations which had resulted in so many blessings to the curing of diseases. Mme. Curie and her husband were desperately poor when they discovered radium, but they refused to capitalize their discovery, maintaining that it should be used for the benefit of all mankind, and not as a source of wealth for any individual. Mme. Curie has done more for the cause of science in medicine and surgery than any other person since Pasteur, who like herself, was a devout Catholic.

Public Health Nurses In St. Paul Schools Provided by City

Minneapolis, Minn., Oct. 25.—The sum of \$6,000 has been allowed by the municipal board of estimate and taxation to provide for six public health nurses to supervise the health of children in 21 parochial schools of Minneapolis. It was announced this week.

It is a victory for the Federation of Catholic Mothers Clubs, which has sought for several years to have the city health department take over the work. The cost of health service has previously been met by assessments against the various parishes by the archdiocesan bureau of education.
