of the Bishops was that taken with a view toward uniformity among the dioceses in the matter of mixed marriages. A Commission, composed of Cardinal Mundelein, Archbishop McNicholas and the Rt. Rev. Hugh C. Boyle, Bishop of Pittsburgh, was designated to study the problem, taking up such subjects as instructions to the non-Catholic before marriage, and the place where the nuptials should take place. This Commission is to report its findings at the next Annual Meeting of the Bishops. There was general discussion of the problem at this year's Meeting, on Wednesday.

National Radio Plan
 Another decision of wide significance and interest was the approval of a plan whereby the Bishops accepted an offer of the National Broadcasting Company to go on the air with a Catholic program over a nationwide radio hook-up once a week, provided the National Council of Catholic Men raises the money necessary for the project.

All Bishops to Be Invited
 At the suggestion of Archbishop McNicholas, a new plan of preparing the agenda for the Bishops' Annual Meeting was approved. It provided that committees of Bishops shall be named previous to the Meeting, to consider any matters proposed for presentation at the Meeting. All the Bishops of the country will be invited to serve on one or more of these committees.

Through the year, any Bishop who wishes any matter to come before the Annual Meeting will communicate with the Administrative Committee and the matter will be referred to the appropriate committee to be considered for inclusion in the agenda.

Archbishop Hanna Reports
 Activities in the Catholic field in a score of directions, several of them of special character, were recounted by the Most Rev. Edward J. Hanna, Archbishop of San Francisco and Chairman of the Administrative Committee of the N. C. W. C., in his report to the Bishops on the year's work of the Administrative Committee. He also dealt in general with the work of the various Departments and Bureaus, reports for each of which were submitted separately.

His Grace presented first a letter from Cardinal Perosi, Secretary of the Sacred Consistorial Congregation, acknowledging receipt of reports on the Conference's activities and extending "heartiest congratulations on the work accomplished." His Eminence added:

"May the activities of the N. C. W. C. increase more and more. Thus will the general welfare of the Church and the faithful be more benefited."

The Chairman then told of the handling by the Administrative Committee of the Rehabilitation Fund for Florida, Porto Rico and Haiti and of the great gratitude of the Ordinaries in those storm-damaged areas.

Gratitude From Mexico
 Throughout the year, he reported, until June the Administrative Committee continued its labors for the return, with dignity and justice, of the Bishops and priests to Mexico and the resumption of public worship. He then read the telegram of Archbishop Ruiz, Apostolic Delegate to Mexico, addressed to the General Secretary of the N. C. W. C., upon the signing of a settlement in Mexico, in which His Grace said: "The work of reconciliation between the Church and the Government started by you and the N. C. W. C. under the auspices of the Apostolic Delegate, Monsignor Fumasoni-Biondi, since March last year, has been crowned with the official documents signed today as the first step toward final settlement. God bless all Bishops, clergy and people of the United States who were kind sympathizers in the days of trial."

Much Proselytizing Done
 While reports now coming from Mexico are "encouraging and hopeful," said His Grace, there is still much to be done and the N. C. W. C. is laboring to be further helpful. Meantime, he added, cognizant of Protestant proselytizing among the many thousands of Mexicans who have come to the United States, the Conference is actively working for the spiritual welfare of these people. He ascribed this latest problem as "one of the most important questions affecting the general well-being of the Church in this country."

The Administrative Committee, he continued, also has given much study to the welfare of the Catholic negro. More thoughtful appreciation of this problem, he said, is needed, together with more definite steps toward meeting the just demand of the Catholic negro for representation.

Latin American Contacts
 With regard to Latin America, His Grace, after stressing the need for Catholics of the United States interested themselves in their co-religionists in these countries, announced that a Bureau of the N. C. W. C. would be established to handle Latin American contacts.

Help also has been extended in the past year to the Church in Porto Rico and the Philippines, he said. In Haiti, he pointed out, grave danger threatens religious education. He also reported that the Administrative Committee had been able to have representatives at several general civic conferences.

School Director Fined 200 Francs
 Paris, Nov. 15.—The Court of Correction of Clermont-Ferrand has passed a sentence of 200 francs fine and 500 francs damages upon a public school director of that city who, in a pamphlet distributed among members of the Syndicat des Instituteurs, gravely defamed some socialists.

 To Be Confirmed
 On This Sunday**

Very large classes of children and a few adults will be confirmed in three churches in Rochester Sunday, November 17th.

The first Confirmation service of the day will be in Holy Cross Church, 4492 Lake Avenue, at 11 A. M. The Rev. Alexander McCabe, rector of the church, has a large class ready for the reception of the Sacrament. The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, will officiate.

Bishop O'Hern will also officiate at a Confirmation in St. Stanislaus Church, Hudson Avenue, at 3:30 o'clock. The Rev. Stanislaus Szupa, rector of the church, has an unusually large class well prepared for the reception of the Sacrament.

At 4 P. M. Confirmation will be administered in the Church of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel, 53 Ontario Street. The Rt. Rev. Emmett M. Walsh, D.D., Bishop of Charleston, S. C., will officiate. The Rev.
