Father Byrne entered the Jesuit order 31 years ago, was ordained in 1914 and filled a number of high offices in the order.

In 1921 Father Byrne became president of Ateneo College, Manila, Philippine Islands, remaining there until 1925, meanwhile becoming a close friend of the late Major Gen. Leonard Wood, the Governor General. In 1925 he assumed his post as director of the shrine at Auriesville, N. Y.

**Italian King  
 And His Queen  
 Visit Vatican**

Hundreds of Thousands Watch Royal Pair Enter New Vatican State—Italian and Papal Flags Flown Side by Side

Vatican City, Dec. 6.—King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Helena visited Pope Pius XI in the Vatican yesterday morning. They were accompanied by an imposing retinue of courtiers. The Pope received them in the Vatican throne room where the three remained for some time. Hundreds of thousands of Italian people turned out to watch the royal pair enter the Vatican grounds, and the King and Queen were cheered all along the route. Thousands of Papal and Italian flags were displayed all over the city in honor of the visit, which was in the nature of the plaudits of the royal pair.

The King and Queen entered the Vatican State at the Arch of Charlemagne. A squadron of Papal gendarmes, in rich uniforms, heralded their arrival with trumpets. A group of Vatican officials escorted them to the throne room, where they knelt and kissed the Pope's feet. Then the doors were closed, and then his voice as he spoke as he looked within the breasts of the three.

Two chairs had been placed beside the Papal throne, one on each side. The King and Queen were seated during the interview, which was a lengthy one, which was not interrupted by the Pope's visit. The King and Queen were escorted to the office of Cardinal Gasparri, Papal Secretary of State. The Cardinal dressed in his flowing robes, met them in the first room of his apartments and introduced them to various Vatican officials.

Prayed at the Tomb of Peter—After leaving the apartments of Cardinal Gasparri the King and Queen went to the Basilica of St. Peter. Cardinal Merry Del Val met them at the threshold of the garden and offered them holy water. They then went to the altar of the Blessed Sacrament, to the Papal altar, and then to the center of the Cathedral where they knelt and prayed at the tomb of St. Peter.

**Mexico Church  
 Warns Against  
 Revolution Aid**

Mexico City, Dec. 6.—Because of the peculiar national conditions resulting from the recent elections, the Church in Mexico is taking special precautions to prevent resumption of the post-revolution civil war.

In the words of His Excellency the Most Rev. Leopoldo Ruiz y Flores, Apostolic Delegate to Mexico, his mission is to bring to the Holy See, instructing members of the hierarchy to use their influence to warn their parishioners against engaging in revolutionary activity. This precaution was deemed necessary because of the attacks of Kasso's party, following the overthrow of the government of Carranza, which has caused the country to be divided into the hands of the revolution and the government, and it is necessary to find fault with Carranza.

**Sisters of Mercy  
 To Observe Jubilee**

St. Francisco, Dec. 6.—The Sisters of Mercy will celebrate the 75th anniversary of the order in the Cathedral of St. Francis on Dec. 12, 1929. The anniversary of the order into St. Francisco 75 years ago will be celebrated with solemn ceremonies. The Mass of Thanksgiving will be celebrated in the Cathedral in St. Francisco.

Members of the Order from all parts of California and Arizona will unite in the community celebration. The story of the order's history, which the Sisters encountered in founding St. Mary's Hospital will be told.

When they left the church the King and Queen were escorted by Papal dignitaries to the boundary of the Vatican City. They were cheered by an immense throng all along the route to the Quirinal.

King Emmanuel and Queen Helena were the first sovereigns of United Italy to enter the Vatican, and their visit was outward evidence of the peace and harmony now existing between Italy and the Vatican.

**Catholics Among  
 War Dead Brought  
 From Russia to U.S.**

New York, Dec. 6.—The bodies of 25 Michigan soldiers, who died in Archangel, Russia, campaign of 1919, reached their homeland November 29, when the S.S. President Roosevelt docked at Hoboken.

Services for the 15 identical Catholics in the group were held at the Rev. Ferdinand Bogner of St. Peter and Paul Church in Hoboken. The bodies were the majority of the group of 84 that left Russia more than a month ago. Eleven were left in St. Petersburg, at the request of relatives.

**Anglican Bishop's  
 Resignation Is  
 Asked by People**

London, Dec. 6.—Two hundred persons headed by two clergymen, marched to the residence of the Anglican Bishop of Truro, Dr. Frere, to demand his resignation because of his authorization of the Prayer Book which Parliament rejected.

Recently there was a scene in the cathedral following the previous evening at which the Bishop's announcement that he sanctioned the use of the new service in the Prayer Book.

The procession to the Bishop's house followed a public meeting at which speakers declared that Bishop's action was detrimental to the authority of the House of Commons, subversive of representative government and a sinister attempt to undermine the constitution of the Church.

The Bishop was not at home when the procession arrived, and his presence was either not requested or the demonstrators, it called upon the Bishop to place his resignation in the hands of the Crown. The Bishop was no disorder. The assembly sang the national anthem before dispersing.

**New Rhine Bridge  
 Receives Impressive  
 Catholic Dedication**

Berlin, Dec. 6.—On the occasion of the blessing of the new bridge over the Rhine between Dusseldorf and Neuss before it was opened to traffic, Dean Schmitz of Neuss delivered an impressive address.

"A blessing from above," the priest said, "must needs be asked upon this work of the hand of man. Let us remember that the Tower of Babel marked the beginning of man's proud enterprises. But the centuries saw it destroyed and as a pestilence as the spider's web that rent by the storm. This calls to mind the story of St. Felix of Nivea fleeing from his enemies, hid in the cleft of an old wall. With marvelous rapidity, a spider spun web over the opening, so that his pursuers neither saw nor suspected his hiding place. Safe and sound Felix lay in his sanctuary. His Bishop, the holy Paulinus, spoke of Felix's escape in these beautiful words: 'Where Christ is, the spider's web is as a wall; where Christ is not, the wall is but a spider's web.'"

**John J. McKenna,  
 Journalist, Dies**

Philadelphia, Dec. 6.—John J. McKenna, for many years a newspaper man in Philadelphia and Newark, died here Wednesday at the age of 83. During his career he was chiefmaster of St. Mary's Church, the Church of the Sacred Heart.

**Catholic Boy Gives  
 Blood To Save**

New Orleans, Dec. 6.—The life of Henry Weinacker, 19, Spring Street, a freshman halfback, who was injured when crushed between two automobiles, was saved by blood given by a classmate, Jimmy Breen of Nashville, Tenn.

Weinacker was attempting to pass an automobile from the center of intersection, where it had run on gasoline, when the second car struck it, crushing him between them. The hospital it was found necessary to amputate his leg; and a transfusion was called for. Breen was the one selected from about Spring Hill students who volunteered.
