## Archbishop Hanna Sails For Rome, Italy, to Ordain His Nephew on Feb. 16th

Archbishop Edward J. Hanna of San Francisco, Cal., sailed from New York City, Wednesday this week, on the S.S. Biancamano, for Rome, Italy, where on Sunday, February 16th, he will ordain his nephew, Clark B. Hanna, to the priesthood. The Archbishop was accompanied by his brother, Frank N. Hanna and Mrs. Hanna of 59 Wellington Avenue, Rochester, parents of the young man who is to be ordained. Mr. and Mrs. Hanna left Rochester on Tuesday, and were met in New York City by Archbishop Hanna on Wednesday. The Archbishop has been invited to officiate at the ordination of his nephew, and has accepted the invitation.

Clark B. Hanna made his preparatory course in St. Andrew's Seminary in Rochester, and six years ago went to the North American College in Rome, Italy, where he made his seminary course. He has not been home during that time. His ordination will take place in the cathedral of the North American College. Mr. and Mrs. Hanna will return soon after the ordination, but their son will remain in Europe for some little time.

After his ordination, Clark B. Hanna will be connected with the Rochester Diocese. He has many friends here who will unite in prayers for him on his ordination day, and who will be glad to welcome him back to his home and his home people.
