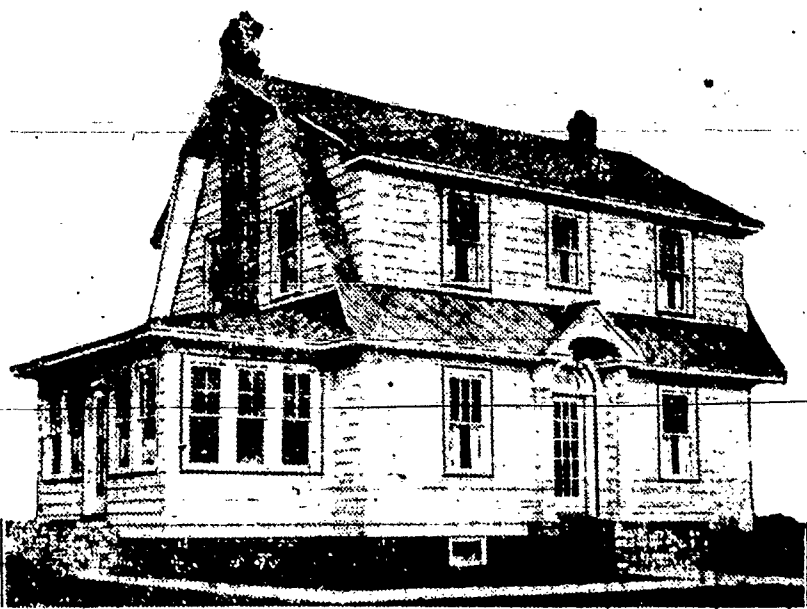

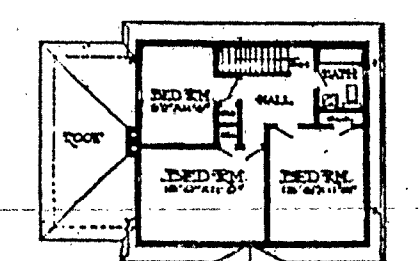

Building a home is an experience that most families go through only once in a lifetime. To the average man building and paying for a home requires considerable sacrifice. For these reasons every prospective home builder should give the most careful consideration to the design of the home he intends to build. Of course, the woman of the household will have the most to say about the final selection of the interior as she is the one who has the work to do and will have her own idea about the arrangement and sizes of the rooms. The man,

24 feet. The architect who designed this house, however, has put in wide dormers and has broken the roof lines to give the effect of a much larger house and a very elaborate one. As a matter of fact, a glance at the floor plans will show that this house is very like the ordinary two-gable plain house.

Two other features of this home are good. One is the colonial type of entrance at the center of the front and the other is the built-in sunroom at the end.

Inside this home are six large rooms besides the sun parlor. The living room is larger than ordinarily found, being 15 feet 6 inches by 10 feet 6 inches. On either side of the open fireplace are french doors leading to the sun parlor. This arrangement gives added space to the living room and easy access to the sun parlor. Dining room and kitchen are at the other end.

Upstairs there are three bedrooms and the bathroom, all adjoining the center hall. One feature that will appeal to the housekeeper is the three closets, one off each bedroom.

Considered from several standpoints this is an unusually good house design. It is attractive in exterior appearance, is economical in build and provides three comfortable rooms.

Insulating Lumber Is Cheap and Efficient

Thousands of American homes already built with insulating lumber show extraordinary results in comfort and economy. Where synthetic lumber is used for sheathing in place of ordinary lumber it serves two purposes: rigid, strong construction and insulation against heat and cold. On inside walls it replaces lath and makes a beautiful smooth wall with plaster applied directly to the surface. On the roof under the slate, shingles or prepared roofing, it protects the entire house against outside heat in summer and prevents leakage of heat in winter.

In the light of these developments, insulation can no longer be called a luxury. It is ready to take its place beside the staple, everyday necessities such as brick, stone, wood, concrete and steel. The future modern home builder will no more sacrifice the blessings of insulation than he would give up the health and comfort of modern plumbing, lighting or heating. The scheme of progress we call civilization consists merely of the gradual adoption of improvements that create better living conditions. Better living means better people. The better citizens of the future will owe no small part of this higher standard to the men who in the present day are making better homes possible for all.

Insulation Big Factor in Proper Heat Level

Draughty rooms are not only uncomfortable—they are unhealthy. Our standards of heating and ventilation are set by the school, the church, the office, the store, the shop, where we spend a large part of our time. In such places, thanks to the modern architect and engineer, we become accustomed to temperature maintained at a proper level constantly. So the effect when we go into a home that's always overheated or chilly and full of draughts is uncomfortable, uncomfortable and unhealthy.

Nor can we forget that clothes have much to do with housing standards. The day of the red flannel petticoat is gone. Thin skirts, chiffon stockings, sleeveless and collarless dresses make uniform proper temperatures a necessity to comfort and health.

So insulation is more than an economy. It is a guaranty of comfort and a protection of health.

Overcoating Old Home Eliminates Drafts

The process of overcoating, if properly done, with proper flashing of windows and doors, should help considerably in freeing the house of drafts.

Overcoating a house is not so difficult a process as might be supposed. It consists in nailing directly to the old siding a new siding made of shingles or a new siding made of metal lath turned onto the old walls will hold a permanent stucco coat. A brick wall may be built up over any old wall, started on a new concrete footing and tied to the old wall with anchors or S-O-nails.

There is never any need to remove the old siding unless it is hopelessly rotted. If it is in such a condition, it would be well to examine the whole structure to see if it is sound enough so that modernization would be wise. Loose clapboards should be nailed tight, but otherwise the wall need not be touched.

Brick Construction Is Not So Expensive

A Des Moines (Iowa) builder erected two small houses, identical in every respect except that one was frame and the other face brick construction. Final costs showed that the face brick cost but \$34.80 more than the frame house. Total costs for the houses were \$2,001.50 for the face brick and \$2,810.50 for the frame.

Cold Floors and Drafty Rooms Most Disagreeable

The windows may be loose, warped or shrunken. Loose windows allow the ready entrance of cold air and the house on the windward side will generally be cold and drafty if the entrance of air through the windows is permitted.

The remedy may be weather stripping, fitting storm windows or replacing the flooring.

Poor floors often allow cold air to creep in, thus disturbing the heating arrangements and causing the fuel bills to mount to an unreasonable figure.

Poor floors should be replaced by well seasoned hard wood. Properly installed by an experienced builder using good material, your floors should be practically airtight and cold resisting.

Picturesque Missionary. 30 Years Among Indians Of Vancouver I., Retiring

(By N.C.W.C. News Service)
Mount Angel, Ore., Feb. 7.—Que-
bec's most picturesque of all the
missionaries working among the In-
dians of Canada, Father Charles
Mosier, O.S.B., is retiring here
soon after thirty years among the
Indians of the Canadian West Coast.
Father Charles, as he is affectionately
known to hundreds of Indians and
others living in the territory, has be-
come famous in three decades in the
north.

Since 1920 the retiring missionary
has been priest-in-charge of all
missions on the West Coast of Van-
couver Island, B. C., with territory
extending from Barkley Sound to
Quatsino, a distance of approximately
300 miles. Although 56 years
old, Father Charles has remained ex-
traordinarily active, traveling con-
stantly between the missions of his
territory.

Through his travels he has become
famous, and residents of the West
Coast of Canada, Protestants and Catholics
alike, as well as travelers on the
steamers on that route, will miss the
picturesque figure in the weather-
beaten old straw hat, or in gun
boots and leggings. Father Charles,
when traveling, is more accustomed
to the latter garb, as his points of
disembarkation along the coast usually
have necessitated reaching shore
in a native canoe, with a wet landing
almost a certainty.

**English Benedictine

later formed the community at

fessed in 1857 and was ordained the
following year.
