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

The process of overcoating, if properly done, with proper flashing of windows and doors, should help considerably in freeing the house of drafts.

Overcoating a house is not so difficult a process as might be supposed. Shingles may be nailed directly to the old siding; a new siding may be nailed over the old. Metal lath furred onto the old walls will hold a permanent stuceo coat. A brick wall, may be built up over any old wall. started on a new concrete footing and tied to the old wall with usu-tiles or 80-d nalls.

There is never any need to remove the old siding unless it is hopelessly If it is in such a condition, it would be well to examine the whole structure to see if it is sound enough so that modernization would be wise. Loose ciapboards should be nailed down tight, but otherwise the wall need not be touched.

"In Africa, the golden jubilee of the missions of Uganda permits us to measure the road covered. It is becoming ever more clear that Africa is moving rapidly and that the barque of ancient fetishism is foundering. In the Cameroons the progress of Catholicity is enormous; the whole country is on the march toward the Church. The Eucharistic Congress in Durban revealed that though Catholics in South Africa are relatively limited in number, they constitute a highly representative body in the Church. The nomination of Archbishop Dellaplane as Apostolic Delegate to the Belgian Congo will permit the co-ordination of the very fruitful mission action in this vast territory. In Bangueolo, Rhodesia, the Vicar Apostolic estimates that in 25 years there will be no pagans left in his area. This will undoubtedly be true for much of black Africa.
