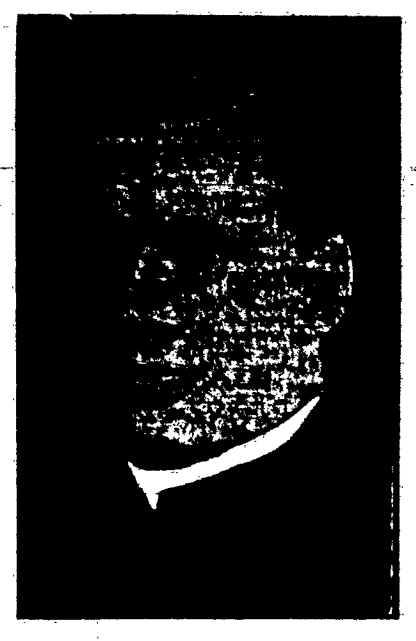

**Western N. Y. Sodalities Will Hold Convention At Nazareth College Soon**

The organization of a movement for student spiritual leadership in the United States, though comparatively new, has now become widespread. It is the result of a realization of what Catholic youth can do in a modern age for the great Catholic cause. Practically all of the Catholic colleges in the country have societies to carry on this work. These societies are composed of and controlled by the students, with the central organization in St. Louis.

The central organization is in direct contact with all of the sodalities by means of a monthly paper, "The Queen's Work," edited by Rev. Daniel A. Lord, S. J. This keeps them in touch with national campaigns, plans and conventions.

Country-wide conventions have been held at Chicago, St. Louis, and conventions for the sodalities of New York have been held at Fordham University, New York, and Canisius College, Buffalo. Nazareth College sent representatives to both conventions, and also to a recent convention of the sodalities of Western New York in the Spring, and it will be held at Nazareth College, Rochester. The date has been set for early in Lent. The Catholic people of Rochester are invited to attend this meeting, to see for themselves the spirit, the enthusiasm, and the whole-hearted effort with which
