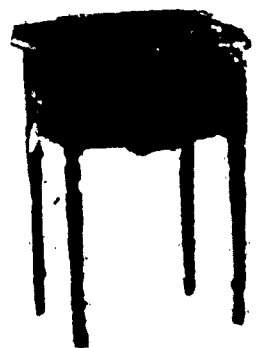

He will begin with the "Chimes of Normandy", by Planquette, and will present it in the Holy Family Auditorium the last week in April or the first week in May.
