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**National Congress
Of The Eucharist
League In Omaha**

(By N.C.W.C. News Service)
Washington, Feb. 22.—Under the auspices of the Priests' Eucharistic League, a National Eucharistic Congress will be held in the city of Omaha, on September 23, 24, 25 of the present year. The Rt. Rev. Joseph Schrembs, Bishop of Cleveland, who is the League's President in the United States, accepted the cordial invitation of Bishop Rummel to hold a national convention in that city. But after due deliberation it was agreed that, instead of calling merely a convention of the League members, the time was ripe for a Congress, to which the laity of the entire country, as well as the clergy would be invited.

It will not be the first gathering of its kind in the United States. As far back as October, 1895, the first National Eucharistic Congress met in Washington, D. C., under the presidency of the late Bishop Moses of Covington, the then National Protector of the League. Similar National gatherings have been held in St. Louis in 1901, at New York in 1904, at Pittsburgh in 1907, and at Cincinnati in 1911. Omaha's will be the sixth National Eucharistic Congress.

Bishop Rummel has already appointed the committees who will be in charge of arrangements for the Congress. They are planning to make it one of the outstanding Catholic events of the year. While a National Congress cannot hope to equal, in scope and numbers in attendance, the splendor and impressiveness of an international Congress, still it is anticipated that Omaha will present a demonstration of Catholic belief in the Blessed Eucharist vividly reminiscent of the unforgettable scenes at Chicago in 1926.

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
