Civil War Sister Dies at Age of 92; Nun for 75 Years

Baltimore, March 28.—Sister Mary Veronica, whose family name was Klimkiewicz, and who saved the life of her brother while nursing the wounded at the battle of Gettysburg, died here Tuesday in St. Agnes' Hospital, at the age of 92. She had been a nun for 75 years, which is believed to be a record in this country.

Sister Veronica was born in Washington in 1838, and became a Sister of Charity in 1855. She nursed soldiers throughout the Civil War, and at Gettysburg had an experience that would tax the credulity of the average reader of melodramas. She was ministering on the battlefield to a man, apparently dying, who lay among dead and wounded. As she sponged the blood from his face the features of her own brother, a Union soldier, were revealed. She bound his wounds and had him taken to a hospital, where she nursed him back to health.

Sister Veronica was received as a novice at Emmittsburg, Md., on Oct. 24, 1854, and had served as a sister in Detroit, Albany, Washington, Los Angeles, Buffalo, St. Louis and Philadelphia.

Religion Alone Gives to Woman Correct Ideals

New York, March 28.—"Religion alone can give to woman the ideals which will give her the proper character, so as to make for purification and not corruption," said the Rev. John Carter Smyth, in a sermon in the Church of St. Paul the Apostle here last Sunday.

"The woman outside of the church has in part become rather superficial in dress and has climbed to the level of man even in drink," said Father Smyth, in giving a criticism on woman. "This is a little overdrawn, perhaps, but the fact is that the woman of today cuts her hair like man, dresses like him," he said.

"Have we not the right to ask if she is lacking in the proper moral sanctions? How are women in business? Is business better now than when women have more freedom? Are there more moral complications and less materialism today? The social life is supposed to be influenced by the customs and fashions which women set in this century.

Referring to college women, he said that many of them receive their training at the feet of those who deny the supernatural. They can have greater reverence to lift up and inspire themselves to greater achievement, he declared.

"Especially in social life, where woman's sway is almost supreme, have we not the right to ask if her influence has been corrective? Is the fashion of the day more decorous and more refined? Do the amusements of the hour—the stage, the film, the dance, the novel—reveal a striving after what is dignified and wholesome on the part of those who have so large a share in their support?"

"And if the answer is, as many think it might be, in the negative, does it not suggest that the influence woman brings to society wants in some essential qualities; that her religious ideals through faith or neglect are ineffective?"
