Chicago, March 28.—The national Catholic basketball championship for the second consecutive year belongs to a big well-coached team representing De La Salle Institute, of Chicago.

De La Salle, reaching the peak of its form in the championship contest of Loyola University's seventh annual national Catholic tournament last night, overpowered a small, fighting team from Jasper, Ind., Academy, 25 to 14.

Right from the start the De La Salle team was a favorite, its playing being snappy, its attack vigorous and its guard work excellent.

There were 32 teams entered in the tournament, and many of the games were spectacular. For instance, De La Salle had a hard time beating St. Xavier High of Louisville, Ky., and the score was only 11 to 9, indicating how iron-tough was the guard work of both teams.

Cardinal's Friend Dies In Boston

Boston, March 28.—Henry V. Cunningham, noted lawyer, died last Saturday at his home here, a victim of heart disease, at the age of 63. He was chairman of the State ballot law commission, president of the Union Institution for Savings and personal friend and counsel of Cardinal O'Connell. A native Bostonian, he was educated in the public schools, graduated from Roxbury High School, studied law at Boston University Law School and was admitted to the bar in 1885. Pope Pius X made him a Knight Commander of the Order of St. Gregory, in 1912.

The Polish Ambassador To America Answers Charge About Seizure of Churches

Washington, March 28. (N. C. W. C. News Service)—Tytus Filipowicz, Ambassador of Poland to the United States, has just issued a statement to the N. C. W. C. News Service in which he refutes the charge made by Metropolitan Sergius, the present chief patriarch of the Russian Orthodox Church, that "the Catholic Church under the Pope's leadership in Poland alone in 1929 forcibly confiscated 500 Orthodox Russian churches, converting them to Catholic uses."

This charge of Metropolitan Sergius has received widespread publicity in this country recently, and is given prominence in an article on "Godliness and Humburgery" in the current issue of The Nation. Metropolitan Sergius is represented as supporting the Soviets in their religious policy. After making this charge, by which he denounces the Pope as the enemy of the Orthodox Church, he is quoted as saying: "As far as we know, no archbishops in England or elsewhere acted against Catholic violence."

The statement of Ambassador Filipowicz tells how the Russian Government seized and confiscated a large number of Greek (Orthodox) and Catholic churches and monasteries in Poland, after the Polish insurrections of 1830 and 1863; thus depriving the rightful owners, forcibly of these churches. When freedom was granted to the Polish people at the end of the World War in 1919, the Polish ambassador says, these churches were restored to their rightful owners. There was no confiscation. If the churches had been left in the hands of the Russian Orthodox clergy, the ambassador says, there would be no parishioners for them. "Permit me to add," says the ambassador, "that the Greek Orthodox Church in whose name Metropolitan Sergius is reported to speak, has been in Poland since 1924 an autocephalous church, that is, it forms an independent Polish Greek Orthodox church. It has its Metropolitan and six bishops. A Sub-Faculty for Greek Orthodox Theology is incorporated with the Warsaw University. There are in Poland over 400 of Greek Orthodox churches, the Orthodox Greek church in Poland being considered on the same level as the Roman Catholic Church, as its clergy receive pensions from the Government."

League Gets Complaint

Geneva, March 14.—The League of Nations has received from the Orthodox Church of Russian Poland a petition in which it is charged that the Catholic Church, through court action, has taken over 500 former Orthodox churches and monasteries, and that this action amounts to confiscation.

Dr. Butler Visits The Vatican, and Will Study Library

Vatican City, March 28.—Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, who arrived in Rome Monday with his wife and daughter, visited the Vatican library to inspect the new cataloguing system, which recently was installed with American financial aid. Dr. Butler was welcomed by Cardinal Ehrle, the Vatican Librarian, and Cardinal Pacelli, Papal Secretary of State. He expects to spend two or three days studying the library, and will also be received by the Pope. Through arrangements made by Ambassador de Martino at Washington and Ambassador Garrett in Rome, he also will be received by Premier Mussolini. He expects to remain in Rome for two weeks.

Appointed Arch Priest

Vatican City, March 28.—Pope Pius on Wednesday appointed Cardinal Pacelli arch-bishop of St. Peter's Basilica, succeeding the late Cardinal Merry Del Val.

Msgr. Harry A. Quinn, rector of the Cathedral, was celebrant; Msgr. William E. Mackessy, deacon, and the Rev. C. Carroll Kerr, sub-deacon.

Utica, March 28.—A branch of the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick has been organized here, and steps taken to make it a permanent body.
