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Sacred Love Story of Mass Shown to a Great Audience By Rev. Geo. A. Keith, S. J.

The largest audience that has ever assembled in the Columbus Civic Center Auditorium was present there on the evening of April 10th, when the Rev. George A. Keith, S. J., showed in beautiful pictures "The Sacred Love Story of the Mass," depicting the celebration of the Mass in many countries and under a large variety of conditions. The pictures were shown under the auspices of the Catholic Women's Club. The audience filled the big auditorium to overflowing; every bit of standing room was taken, and it was regrettably necessary to turn away several hundred people.

Father Keith has spent many years collecting these pictures, and he has a collection that is remarkable in its diversity and truly remarkable in its fidelity to truth and to life. Father Keith was a Chaplain of the U. S. Marines during the World War, and some of his pictures show the celebration of the Mass under fire—out in the battle line, where the closeness of death lends a tragic significance to the great sacrifice. The pictures, too, show the Mass in ancient and modern times—its continuity, its unchangeableness, its ever-present closeness to the hearts of the people.

The pictures were enhanced by beautiful instrumental music played by the Rev. Benedict Elmman, and by explanations of the most apt and appealing kind by Father Keith. The Bausch & Lomb Co. was most helpful in preliminary preparation for the showing of the pictures, and in furnishing slides. The courtesy of the company was greatly appreciated by Father Keith, and by the Catholic Women's Club.

Father Keith took his audience back with him to the early days of sacrifice, showing the sacrifice of a lamb on the altar of God by Abel. He emphasized the point that each movement of the priest, each prayer and act of the priest is symbolic of some part of the passion and death of Christ. He told his hearers they should attend the Mass with clean hearts, and with souls filled with prayer, because they are present at the unbloody sacrifice of Calvary.

Nuptial Masses were shown, in quiet, and high and low Masses; pictures of the great cathedrals of the world; midnight Mass at Christmas, with the exterior of the great Cathedral of Cologne lit up with snow, and many other wonderful scenes. The pictures, beautifully colored, told a beautiful and appealing story; a story that touched the heart of every person in that great audience, and that left an impression for good with all.
