

Cardinal Gibbons Statue Will Be Erected at Once By Knights of Columbus

Washington, D. C., April 18.—Announcement has just been made here that the Supreme Council of the Knights of Columbus will proceed at once with the erection of the memorial statue of the late James Cardinal Gibbons in the City of Washington, D. C. The erection of the statue by the order was authorized at the last Supreme convention, held in August, 1929. The Supreme Board of Directors, at a recent meeting in Washington, decided

to go ahead with the work. This statue will be a gift to the people of the United States from the Order, and will stand on a plot provided by the Federal Government immediately in front of Sacred Heart Church at Sixteenth Street and Park Road. Permission for the erection of the statue was granted by the Seventieth Congress of the United States, in a joint resolution passed by both houses.

A committee to carry the work through to completion was appointed by the Board of Directors, as follows: Supreme Knight, Martin H. Carmody, chairman; Supreme Secretary William J. McGinley, Treasurer Daniel J. Callahan, Supreme Advocate Luke E. Hart and Past State Deputy Charles W. Darr of the District of Columbia.

The New Marmon Roosevelt Cars On Display Now

The initial local display of the new Marmon-Roosevelt together with other body styles in the Marmon straight-eight line for 1930 has been arranged by Lohman & Walters, Inc., local Marmon distributor, 306 East Avenue.

The Marmon-Roosevelt, as its new name indicates, bears a close family resemblance to other products in the Marmon line. Its radiator, hood, body lines and entire general appearance follow familiar Marmon style and design and the car itself gives an instant impression of relationship with the 1930 Marmon mode of design.

Refinements in chassis design, particularly with respect to the front axle and spring system, bring the new model appreciably lower to the ground and this fact, combined with larger tire sizes, a more massive front end and redesigned fenders, has resulted in more beautiful as well as sturdier appearance from bumper to bumper. The car is 14 feet, 4 inches in length, from bumper to bumper. A larger radiator similar in contour to the radiators on other Marmon cars with a pointed beak and ample depth for effective chromium plating, is used and the name plate has been redesigned in accordance with the new name of the car.

The Marmon-Roosevelt continues to be manufactured in four body styles. These types are a five-passenger sedan, two-passenger coupe with rumble seat, four-passenger victoria coupe, and convertible coupe with rumble seat. Cars are available in either wood or wire wheels with the latter, mounted forward, included in deluxe equipment at moderate additional cost.

Mission Priest In Korea Field Honored by Pope

Vatican City, April 18.—Pope Pius has announced the appointment of Father John J. Norris of the Catholic Foreign Mission Society of America, with headquarters at Maryknoll, N. Y., to be apostolic prefect of Korea.

Father Norris was born in Fall River, Mass., and officiated as a priest at St. Joseph's Church in the Fall River diocese for a number of years before becoming a missionary. He is now in Korea. His predecessor in the office was promoted to be assistant general at Maryknoll.

Bishop Urges Parents to Help Fight Diphtheria

Elmira, April 18.—The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, addressed a letter "To Our Catholic Parents of Elmira" in regard to the campaign that is being conducted by State Health authorities to stamp out diphtheria. The letter was read at all Masses in the churches here Sunday, and it impressed upon parents the necessity of co-operating with the authorities in the clinics that will be held at the State Armory here on May 8, 15 and 22.

Bishop O'Hern pointed out in his letter the good effects of the work that is being done by the State, and how this work has resulted in the checking of the dread disease of diphtheria among school children. In conclusion the letter says:

"In doing this, we shall bring blessings upon our families and homes which have been blessed by God with children, and we shall be helping the community and the nation in the preservation of one of the greatest assets of our national life, namely, strong and healthy children.

"Hoping that our good parents will heed the advice of our medical authorities, and will endeavor to avail themselves of this special opportunity for protection against sickness and disease, and praying God's blessing upon all those who are striving to help in the matter of protecting the little ones, I remain
