Soviet Godless Society Urges Russian Atecists To Keep Quiet Easter

Moscow, April 18—“Soft-pedaling” the anti-Passover and anti-Easter campaigns is urged in an article headed, “No Noise,” in a recent issue of “The Godless One,” the organ of the League of Militant Godless. The article asks atheists to refrain from the carnivals, demonstrations and meetings, which had been planned to take place in front of synagogues and churches during Easter and Passover.

Pointing out that a few weeks ago the Soviet masses demonstrated against the Pope's “crusade,” and that on May 1 they will demonstrate with anti-religious slogans, the Godless One asks whether under such circumstances “it is necessary to squeeze in another anti-religious demonstration on Passover and Easter,” and replies that “it is not necessary and is not practical.”

The article coincides with increasing reports from small Jewish towns saying that local Jewish Communists have discarded their anti-Passover plans, many of them openly stating that “fighting religion nowadays in the Soviet is wasting energy, since life itself leads numbers of religious people to become less so each year.”

The White Russian (Minsk) Commissariat of Education has issued instructions not to abuse any religious feelings during Passover or Easter. The Jewish Communist

press, while not as active in the anti-Passover campaign as in previous years, reports that the matzoth bakeries are busier this year than ever before and calls for anti-religious seditors, meetings, lectures and concerts on the eve of Passover to counteract the traditional seditors.

Old Monastery Will Celebrate Its 750th Year

Brandenburg, Germany, April 18.—Plans are being made to celebrate in the Fall the 750th anniversary of the Lehnin Abbey, situated eight miles from this place. This is one of the oldest Cistercian monasteries in Germany. It was founded in 1180, for Cistercian monks, by Otto II, Margrave of Brandenburg. It is in a good state of preservation, and its jubilee will be observed with great pomp.

Beloved Actor Highly Honored By State Stars

New York, April 15.—Fritz Williams, actor and shepherd of the Lambs, was laid at rest last Friday morning in Woodlawn Cemetery. His funeral was held in St. Malachy's Church, with Father Francis P. Duffy, chaplain of the famous 54th Regiment, as celebrant of the Mass. Over a thousand people filled the church to the doors. Most of the mourners were stage folk, many of them famous.

As Father Duffy intoned the service, the coffin covered by a blanket of violets, gardenias and lilies-of-the-valley, the gift of the Lambs, was borne to the head of the casket aisle, followed by the honorary pallbearers, all prominent in the world of the stage. There were scores of other floral tributes.

A Galaxy of Stars: The honorary pallbearers were Clay M. Green, De Wolf Hopper, A. C. Brown, R. E. Burman, Thomas Meighan, Wilton Lindaby and William Courtleigh. Assistants: Edwin Milton Royle, Leslie Howard, Boy of the Club, Lellie Howard, Boy of the Club, Square, in which Mr. Williams was appearing when he died; Frank Gilmore, John Emerson and Frank Clegg.

The ushers were Wallace Ford, Jack Devereaux, Fred G. Lyle, Bruce Elmore, Brandon Tynan, Carl Randall and Pedro de Cordova. Delegations from several other groups of actors were present. A large section of the church was occupied by The Lambs, near whom sat Mrs. Katherine Florence Williams, the widow.
