## CORNING

### Holy Name Hears Harry B. Crowley

Corning, April 18.—Harry B. Crowley of Rochester was the principal speaker at the recent Communion Breakfast of the St. Vincent de Paul Holy Name Society here. Mr. Crowley told some excellent stories, then he made a fervent plea for cleanliness of speech.
