Laborites Expell Members Favoring Catholic Schools

London, April 25.—Two more town councillors—this time at Chorley, Lancs.—have been "expelled" from the local labor party because they gave their support to Catholic schools in a matter which the party had instructed its representatives to take an opposite view.

Last week the Liverpool labor party "expelled" Councillor Patrick Moorhead, a labor member of the Liverpool town council, because he tabled a resolution favoring Catholic schools without having first obtained the party's approval. As a result the labor group in council was split in halves.

The Liverpool case is being considered by the national executive committee of the labor party.

Precious Blood Order Will Build A New Juniorate

Priests of the Congregation of the Precious Blood recently opened a mission church in this city, the Church of the Precious Blood on Lexington Ave. and Stenson St.

The priests of this congregation specialize in giving missions for the Italian people, and several missions have been given already by the priests in Rochester.

There will be interest here, therefore, in the announcement that a new juniorate in charge of the Congregation of the Precious Blood will be built on a site of nearly 300 acres located five miles northwest of Canton, O. The building will cost approximately \$500,000 and work will begin early in the summer.

The new juniorate will replace what is now known as the St. Mary's Preparatory Seminary, Burkettsville, Mercer County, Ohio, in the Cincinnati archdiocese.

The establishment of the new juniorate in the Cleveland diocese marks an important chapter in the history of this community in Northern Ohio. Rev. Ignatius Wagner, Provincial of the Society, said: "Diocesan history shows that the priests of the Congregation of the Precious Blood were the first religious community to locate permanently in Northern Ohio. The records of the diocese also show that the first missionary endeavors of the Precious Blood Fathers in the vicinity of Canton were made in 1844, when Father Brunner, C.P.P.S., came to America. At that time 14 diocesan priests and seven Precious Blood fathers labored in the territory now included in the Diocese of Cleveland.

Bill Is Signed For the Columbus Civic Center, Inc.

During the past week Governor Roosevelt signed the bill of Senator Cosmo A. Cilano providing for the incorporation of the Columbus Civic Center of Rochester, corner Lawn and Chestnut Streets.

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
