William Welch Dies Suddenly, Buried Monday

William H. Welch, aged 38 years, of 38 Harris Street, died suddenly Friday morning in St. Mary's Hospital, and was buried Monday morning from his parish church, St. Bridget's. His funeral was an unusually large one, with delegations present from the Rochester Fourth Degree Assembly, Knights of Columbus, of which he had been Comptroller; from Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus, of which he had been a welfare secretary for many years; from Musica Caravan, Order of the Alhambra; and from Robertshaw Post, American Legion.

A solemn high requiem Mass was celebrated by the Rev. John B. Sullivan, assistant pastor of St. Bridget's Church, with Rev. Philip Golding and Rev. J. J. Bresnahan as deacon and subdeacon. A male chorus sang the Mass.

The bearers were American Legion members, Eugene A. Callon, Francis J. Heaney, William Westcott, Ralph W. McLeod, Elroy Miller and Charles Hawken. Burial was in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, where Father Bresnahan and Rev. John Hogan pronounced the final blessing at the grave.

Military services were conducted under direction of the American Legion with the following as firing squad: William Bauer, William Burke, Maurice Scanton, Bernard Daley, Paul Smith and John Donlon. Joseph DeFrancisco sounded taps.

Mr. Welch was operated for acute appendicitis a week before his death. He was making an excellent recovery when complications developed, causing his death. There were few men in Rochester who had an acquaintance as wide as he, or friends so numerous. He was known all over the city, and liked and well respected. While in the employ of the Knights of Columbus he had visited hundreds of sick members, done many acts of kindness for them, arranged outlines and plans for luncheon for children, taken the children of Iowa State, tarium year after year to the Ringling Bros. circus; supervised picnics and outings for the Knights of Columbus, the Fourth Degree Assembly and the Alhambra; staged a Christmas entertainment for many years at the State Hospital for all ex-service men in the hospital; delivered boxes of fruit, etc. to all sick ex-service men in the city every Fourth of July, Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter for many years, and done numberless kind things for them—always with a smile, a pleasant word, a helpful word. The accumulated good will of these acts was evidenced in the wealth of flowers he received, in the numerous Mass cards, and in the genuine sorrow felt throughout the city over his death. He will be mourned sincerely, and remembered with gratitude.

Communion Breakfasts For 7,300 Men in New York In Two Sections on Sunday

New York, May 9.—Seven thousand and three hundred men received Holy Communion in two churches in Greater New York on Sunday, and held Communion breakfasts afterwards.

One group was composed of 3,300 policemen, members of the Brooklyn and Queens Police Department Holy Name Society. The other group was composed of 4,000 members of the New York Postoffice Holy Name Society.

The policemen received Holy Communion in a body in St. Augustine's Church, Sixth Avenue and Sterling Place, after which they held a Communion Breakfast at the Brooklyn Elks' Club.

Commissioner Whalen, speaker of the day, said:

"From the day of my appointment I have been trying to make you all understand that your good example means more to the Police Department than any lip service or order that your commander can give. I salute you as the finest army in the world for the preservation of law and order."

There were several other speakers, priests and laymen.

The Postoffice Holy Name Society held a splendid showing. They received Holy Communion in St. Patrick's Cathedral, and held their breakfast afterwards at the Hotel Astor. Cardinal Hayes celebrated the Mass for them, praised them for their loyalty to Church and State, and urged them to spread the principles of the Holy Name Society in their daily lives.

At the Communion Breakfast in the Hotel Astor the Rev. John A. McClorey, president of Detroit University, was the principal speaker. He deplored the lack of religion in the world and urged the men to combat irreligion. Other speakers blamed the crime wave and social unrest on the prohibition laws, and expressed the hope that America's problems in this regard would soon be settled.

Coveted Prizes Are Won In Sculpture and Painting By Two Religious Subjects

New York, May 9.—For the first time in the history of the awarding of the coveted Prix de Rome prize in sculpture and painting, both prizes were awarded to young men who portrayed religious subjects.


A statue of Saint Francis of Assisi, by William Marks Simpson, Jr., of Norfolk, Va., won the sculpture prize, which has a cash value of about \$8,000, including expenses of a three-year residence and study in Rome. The same value attaches to the award in painting, which went to Salvatore De Maio, 78 Howard St., New Haven, Conn. De Maio's large painting, portraying the body of Christ just lowered from the cross.



Boston, Mass., May 9.—A chaplaincy for Holy Cross Cemetery, in Malden, near here, has been created by His Eminence William Cardinal O'Connell. The fact that the grave of the Rev. Patrick J. Power has become a mecca for thousands of pilgrims, led to the Cardinal's action.

Walsh, pastor of St. Joseph's Church, the nearest parish church to the cemetery, and priests from St. Joseph's officiated at all the funerals. However, the added work caused by the influx of pilgrims, and the removal of Father Power's remains to a new cemetery in front of the chapel, has resulted in the creation of the new chaplain post. Father Hogan will make his daily headquarters in the chapel.
