OWEGO Beloved Sister Deeply Mourned

Owego, May 9.—Sister Mary Lavin Murphy, of the Sisters of Mercy, Owego, died Friday, April 25, in St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira, after an illness of two weeks. She was born in Conception, Minnesota, and entered the novitiate of the Sisters of Mercy at Rochester, 15 years ago.

Beloved by young and old in the many missions where she taught, Sister Mary Lavin will be missed by all who knew her. Not only did the faithful nun impart successfully the branches of secular education, but she instilled in the hearts of the young a knowledge of their Creator, to serve as a beacon light in years to come. An exemplary religious, faithful and earnest in every detail of duty, Sister's death is a loss to the community of which she was a member.

The funeral services, held in St. Patrick's Church, were an impressive sight. The procession, formed by the school children and ministers proceeded from the convent to the church. The children of the lower grades took their places in the church, while the academic pupils formed a grand band of honor for their former teacher.

Sister Mary Ellen's life of usefulness has ended, but her example and teaching, best exemplified by an untiring patience, added to great earnestness of character, will live on and be spread by those who have been privileged to come under the influence of her personality. The surviving relatives are her father, Timothy Murphy of Rochester, Minnesota; Mrs. G. W. Coffin of Superior, Wisconsin; Anna Murphy of Corning, New York; four brothers, Timothy Junior, John, Patrick and Martin, all of Rochester, Minnesota. The Sisters of Mercy, of which Sister was a member, and her many friends extend their heartfelt sympathy to the sorrowing family.

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WATKINS GLEN Monsignor Barrett Dies In New Jersey

Watkins Glen, May 9.—Word has been received here of the death on Friday in East Orange, N. J., of the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas H. Barrett, a native of this place. Msgr. Barrett went to East Orange to make his home after his resignation as rector of St. Thomas Church, Buffalo, N. Y., where he had served for 47 years.

Msgr. Barrett was born in Watkins Glen, Jan. 7, 1851. He was ordained March 5, 1881, in the Diocese of Buffalo and in 1925 was raised to the rank of domestic prelate by Pope Pius XI. He studied at Fordham University and Niagara University, receiving the degree of doctor of law from the latter.

After his ordination, Msgr. Barrett was stationed at Lockport, N. Y., then at East Pembroke, N. Y. For eight years he was rector of St. Patrick's Church, Buffalo, N. Y., and also was rector of St. Stephen's Church, Buffalo.

At a breakfast which followed, Cornelius Milliken of Elmira, was the speaker. He was introduced by Bartholomew Scanlon. There was a large attendance.

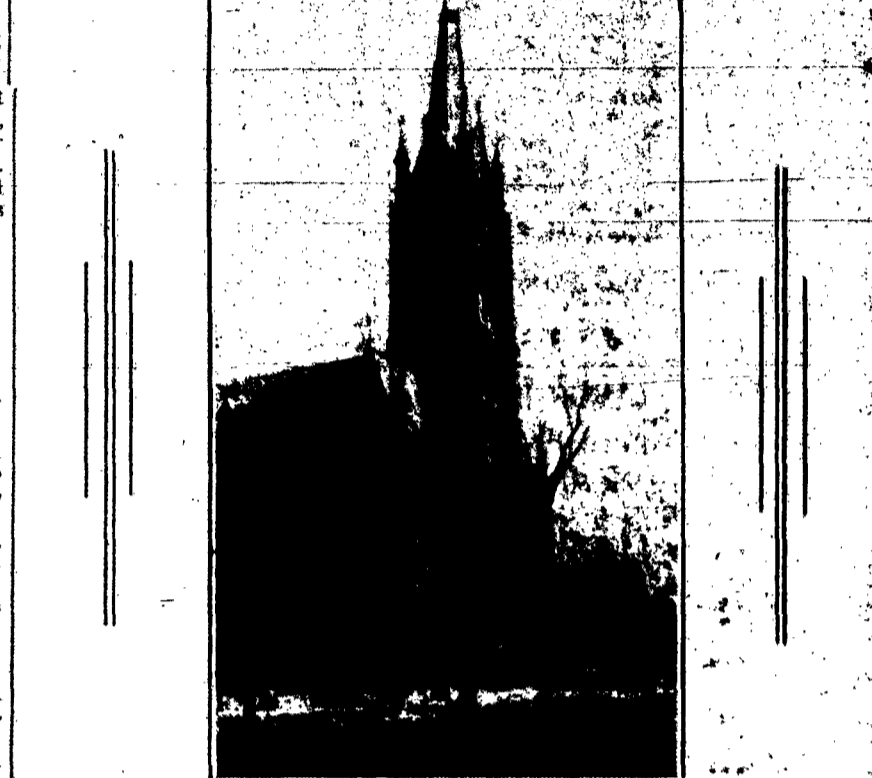
