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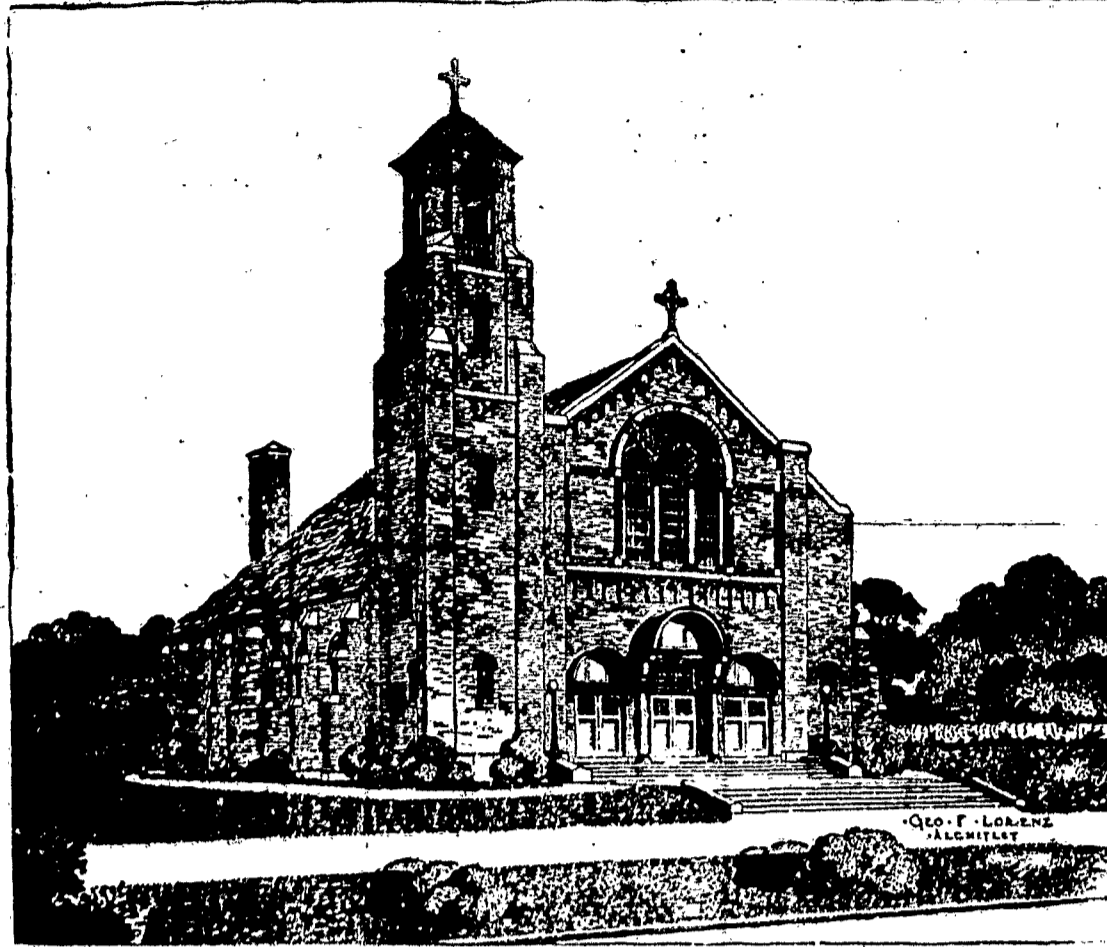

Ground Broken September 23

Ground for the new church was broken on the morning of September 23 last by Bishop O'Hara. Remarkably rapid work has therefore been made on the building since that time. The church will be among the most attractive in the city. It is a credit in every way to the generosity, the industry and the faith of the Italian people, and to the pastor of the parish, the Rev. Walter A. Foery and his assistants, the Rev. Gerald Brennan and Rev. Joseph D'Jelsi.

Father Foery extends a cordial invitation to all friends of the parish or its priests to attend the dedication of the church on May 18.

George F. Lorenz, Architect
The plans for the new church were designed by George F. Lorenz, architect, with offices at 311 Alexander Street. Mr. Lorenz gave special thought and study to this church, with the result that it is considered one of the most attractive and commodious in the city.

Mr. Lorenz is also the architect for the new St. Alphonsus' Church, now under construction in Auburn. This church is similar in design to the Mt. Carmel Church, and will likewise be a beautiful structure.

The church is of modern Romanesque architecture, with red shade of pressed brick, trimmed with granite cut stone. It has a frontage of 69 feet on Woodward Street, is 122 feet deep, and sets back 32 feet from the sidewalk. On the west side is a tower rising 30 feet in height. A series of steps leading from the sidewalk to the main entrance form the approach to the church.

The doors of the main entrance open directly into the narthex, the side walls of which are finished in a caen stone effect, with quarried tiled floor. Opening directly on the narthex is the baptistry, the ushers' wardrobe and the stairs leading to the choir gallery. Behind the

narthex, facing the nave of the church, are the confessionals.

A Beautiful Interior

The church has a beautiful interior. The body of the church has a clear width of 66 feet, with a segmental vaulted ceiling laid out in a series of panels. On the side walls ornamental pilasters, designed in a modified Corinthian style, supporting a plaster cornice, form the decorative effect. The entire floor of the nave is of tile.

The windows throughout are of various shades of amber Cathedral glass, with upper and lower ventilators in each window. On each side of the nave space is reserved for shrines.

A Spacious Sanctuary

There is a large sanctuary, with side altars and entrances to the vestry. A cloister at the rear of the church connects the present church and school building.

The trim is of fumed oak finish, harmonizing with the polychrome wall decorations. The church will be heated by the vacuum vapor system. Acoustical and insulating material has been incorporated in the design.

The roof construction is of the Lamella type, providing an economical method of long span trussless construction.

The General Contractors

The Gorsline & Swan Construction Co. had the general contract for the construction of the church, and this company did a splendid job, creditable to itself, to the church and to the city.
