**Changes Made Among Priests Of the Diocese**

Effective May 17, the following changes among priests of the Diocese have been announced by the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester.

Rev. William W. Heisel, who was ordained in 1916, will be transferred from assistant pastor at Holy Family Church to pastor of St. Joseph's Church, Wayland. Rev. Arthur T. Florack of the same class as Father Heisel, pastor at Wayland, will be chaplain of St. Mary's and St. Patrick's Orphan Asylums here.

Rev. Henry Bieier, ordained in 1926, will be changed from assistant at St. Francis Xavier Church to Holy Family Church. His place will be taken by Rev. Joseph Otte, present chaplain of the orphan asylums. Father Otte was ordained in Belgium, where he was born. All others are natives of Rochester.

**Cathedral Boy Of Springfield Oratorical Star**

Utica, N. Y., May 16.—Edmond D. Bernard, 15-year-old sophomore of the Cathedral High School, Springfield, Mass., and representative of the Springfield Union and Republican, was the winner of the northern zone final in the National Oratorical Contest, held in the auditorium of Utica Free Academy last night before a large audience.

As a result he will appear in the national finals in Washington, May 24, and next summer will be given a free tour of Europe along with six other zone winners in the United States.

Judges Were Unanimous  
He was given first place in the contest by all the judges. He won this distinction also at the Springfield finals. He is a rapid speaker of unusual personality. He has fine diction, is dramatic in utterance, and his gestures were well controlled. He gave the impression both in the prepared and extemporaneous addresses of being thoroughly familiar with his subject, which was "Origins of the Constitution."

Bernard has been a winner throughout his school years. He was a member of the team which won the debating championship of the Springfield diocesan high schools. He was also a winner in an easy contest in the grammar school. He was honored here by Rev. John J. Fowler, professor of public speaking in Cathedral High School, who trained him for the contest.

Dr. Hart Pleased  
Dr. Albert Bushnell Hart professor of government, Harvard University, and famous as writer and historian, who was one of the judges, was so well impressed with the contest that he asked the privilege of appearing upon the stage and expressing his appreciation at the conclusion of the contest.

The other judges besides Dr. Hart were: Hon. Hugh M. Morris, United States judge, district of Delaware, and Dr. Edward Frank Humphrey, professor of history and political economy, Trinity College, Hartford, Conn.

**Knights of St. John Smoker Big Event**


