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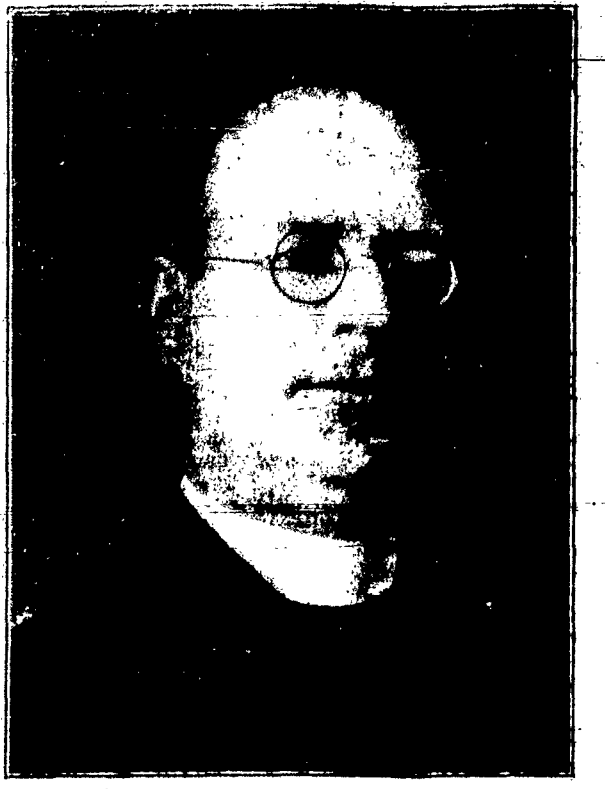

For God and Citizenship

"Here in this beautiful new building, we have not only a parochial school with its ten classrooms and modern equipment, but also a parish hall and provision for social life for the young people. It will become the center of all the educational and social activities of St. Casimir's parish from now on, as the church is the House of God and place of divine worship for the people. Here the Sisters of St. Joseph will teach the little ones a knowledge and love of God, the ten commandments, and their duties of citizenship. Here they will be taught to respect the law of God and the law of man, and will be sent forth as real assets of citizenship to this and every other community in which they may live."

"Today, the world, and especially our own country, needs religious education in order that the awful wave of crime which is now sweeping over the land may be abolished. Here, hand in hand with a knowledge of God and the obligations of conscience, will be taught true patriotism and a love of country, with reverence for the flag and loyalty to it. Every morning these children will, as their first official act after their prayers, pledge allegiance to the Stars and Stripes and the principles for which they stand. In these classrooms side by side with the American flag will be the Cross of Christ, the symbol of our redemption and the flag of Jesus Christ. Here the subjects taught will be based on the curriculum of the great State of New York whose standards we follow, and every teacher standing in these classrooms will have her credentials, her diploma and license to teach."

Civic Pride, Civic Welfare

"Thus in dedicating this splendid building to Catholic education, we are giving the City of Elmira one of the newest and strongest units for civic pride, civic growth and civic welfare. No wonder, then, that the clergy and laity of Elmira gathered around the Bishop and the people of St. Casimir's on this happy occasion to express their joy at what has been accomplished in the comparatively few years of the existence of this parish, and to congratulate the pastor and people on this happy occasion."

Nazareth College

The students of Nazareth College hope to raise \$500 on Mission Day, May 20th. Of this, \$250 will be sent to Father Hilbert in China, and the rest to other missionaries in this country. Father Cunningham among the Slows, Father Warren among the Negroes, Father Tsedman among the Flathead Indians, and Sister Throphane, in Mississippi. Activities of Mission Day will take place in the afternoon and evening, and all friends of the college and of the students are cordially invited to attend, as well as the general public. In charge of the different classes will contain sandwiches, potato cream and cake, candy, balloons, etc. There will be ball game at 2:30, folk dancing at 4:30, and at 7 o'clock a missionary priest will speak. In the evening there will be a card party and dance in the college.

The Irish Mission Unit has added the missions to the extent of \$550 in money, and more than \$1,000 in useful articles, such as nonstrance, a ciborium, vestments, altar linens, religious articles, clothing, toys, etc., during the current year. Two Palatin leaderships have been conferred in the Unit, the highest honor given by the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade. Ida M. P. Holmes, of the Senior Class, and Louise Brown, of the Junior Class, are the recipients.

Officers of the Student Government Association were elected for the coming year as follows: President, Anna Egan; vice-president, Helen Howland; secretary, Mary Neary; treasurer, Mary Cannon. This Association was organized for the first time last September, and has been greatly successful. With Betty Randall as president, a constitution was drawn up, and a student council was appointed to hold regular meetings. All other organizations in the College are subject to the Student Association.

Rev. Daniel O'Connell, S. J., Dean of St. Xavier's College, Cincinnati, was a guest at Nazareth College, May 16. He visited several of the classrooms, and talked informally with the students.

The Students' Spiritual Sodality elected officers for next year to take the place of those whose term will be up in June. Helen Gunter, who was chosen Prefect, and Adelaide Hosenbach, the retiring Prefect, will present as delegates to the Chicago convention, June 21 and 22, together with another representative from each class. The other chairmen of the Sodality are as follows: Mission committee, Mary O'Brien; Our Lady's committee, Mary Leary; Publicity committee, Gaetana Ferlanda; literary committee, Mary Moran.

The Nazareth Guild will sponsor a lawn festival to be held, July 1, at the home of Mrs. Slavin in Genesee Valley Park. Mrs. Slavin and the Guild members are working to make the fete a big success.
