Irish Denounce Soviet Actions In Strong Terms

Dublin, May 16.—At a recent mass-meeting of the Irish Parliamentary Labor Party in this city a group of Soviet sympathizers continually interrupted the meeting by shouting "The Red Flag," waving red flags and calling for three cheers for the Soviets. As a result of this action Sean Lemass, director of publicity of the Irish Republican Party, has issued a condemnation of Soviet propaganda. Other members of Fianna Fail have also publicly condemned the propaganda.

The most eloquent denunciation of the Soviet activities comes from Brian O'Higgins, one of the most distinguished orators and speakers of the Republican movement. Mr. O'Higgins concluded an address to the members of the Sinn Fein Republican Organization as follows: "We have been brought face to face with an Eastern materialism that drags down every high ideal into the gutter, and insults the very name of God."

Bisphenous Speeches
"I protest against the attempt being made in speeches and writings that are a disgrace to bisphenous, to link up this doctrine of stark, gross materialism, with the Republican struggle here in Ireland, and I appeal to the young people to stand out boldly against this unchristian propaganda that has been projected into our midst."

Continuing, Mr. O'Higgins said: "Men who deny God, who are without any sense of duty, who are without any sense of honor, who are without any sense of God—to all things on earth and in heaven. That is a simple truth about which there can be no argument."

"I appeal to the young people of Ireland to cling to the high ideals of the men of Easter Week, to place like them, their cause under the protection of God and to go forward courageously and steadfastly on the road that patriots have pointed out to them, towards the goal of freedom and ours—the complete independence of Ireland."

Rev. Gregory Lou, Priest 54 Years, Dies in Peking

Peking, China, May 16.—The last lone witness of a former generation was lost to Peking, China, in the recent death, after 80 years of life, 54 of which were spent in the priesthood, of Rev. Gregory Lou, Chinese Vincentian. Father Lou, memory brought him back to Feb. 2, 1850, when he saw the Anglo-French occupation of Peking and was vividly impressed by the burning of the Summer Palace.

The veteran priest was born at Chaoklachwan, an ancient Catholic settlement near Peking, on April 14, 1850. He made his studios under Bishop Moule, then Vicar Apostolic of Peking, and was ordained priest March 19, 1876. Sixteen years after ordination he entered the Congregation of the Mission and pronounced his final vows as a religious in 1894. Besides successive posts to the vast area of the original Peking Vicariate, Father Lou is especially remembered for his organization of the parish church of his home town which later became the Cathedral of the Bishop of Anko, and for the publication of doctrinal and devotional works in Chinese.

Father Lou saw the Catholic Church in his section of China grow with great rapidity. When he entered the seminary as a youth, Peking counted 20,000 Catholics. When he closed his eyes in death 80 years later, the territory of old Peking included 500,000 Catholics.

Cornerstones of Two New Churches Laid in Morocco

At Casablanca, he laid the cornerstone of a great basilica, erected in honor of the Sacred Heart which will seat three thousand people. That afternoon he officiated at the laying of the cornerstone of a church containing the extraordinary and beautiful mosaic of the Virgin Mary.

45,398 Persons Were Cared For By N. Y. Hospitals

New York, May 16.—Free or part-pay medical and nursing care was given to 45,398 persons in Catholic hospitals, out-patient departments, convalescent homes and in the homes of patients themselves, in New York City, according to the annual report of the Catholic charities of the Archdiocese of New York, just issued.

The 21 Catholic hospitals of the Archdiocese expended \$1,193,900.44 more than was received for patients' board during the year. A total of 268,588 days of free care was given. Some 18,556 patients were cared for in the hospitals at regular rates.

A total of 542 Sisters work in the year-round care of the sick, 92 of them nursing the sick in their homes. The sum of \$54,576.11 was spent by Catholic charities during the year in special health work. The area covered in the report includes Manhattan, the Bronx, Staten Island and the counties of Westchester, Rockland, Orange, Sullivan, Ulster, Dutchess and Putnam.

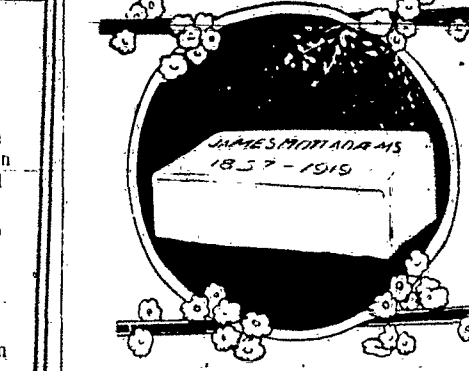

Has 5,000-Mile African Journey To The Missions

(Fides Service)
Khartoum, Anglo-Egyptian Sudan, Africa, May 16.—His Excellency, the Most Rev. Arthur Hinsley, Apostolic Delegate to Africa, has astounded even veteran residents of the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan by his journey of 5,000 miles in 50 days, from February 14th to April 2d. He traveled 1,869 miles by train, 1,843 by boat and 1,288 by automobile. Much of the travelling was over roads in primitive condition. He left for Egypt April 2.
The Anglo-Egyptian Sudan is a vast region in northeastern Africa, extending from the Red Sea to French Equatorial Africa and the Belgian Congo, and from Uganda to Egypt. The population totals 7,200,000 spread over 1,000,000 square miles. Catholics total approximately 25,000 under two bishops and two Prefects Apostolic. The priests of the Congregation of the Sons of the Sacred Heart (Missionaries of Verona) are in charge.
