est effort should be made to organize the liturgical Mother Church. This, of course, means the training of the boys' voices and wherever there is a parochial school, and even where there is none, this can be done with great success, and should be done."

Lady Concerned, Too

The Bishop addresses his letter to the clergy and laity, because he says the laity is interested, too. His letter says:

"As a first request on the part of the laity, then, the Bishop would suggest that our people never request from the pastor anything to be sung in the Church by the choir, or be played on the organ, which is known to be contrary to the spirit of the liturgy, and which conflicts with the Church's regulations of proper music. No mere fancy of popular taste or public opinion should influence our Catholic people when there is a question of offending in the highest way the decorum and the sanctity of God's Temple, His Sacred House of Prayer. Rather let us be glad to make our standard the Church standard, and to listen gladly and willingly to the voice of the authorities of the Church. To be sure, we all enjoy good music of the secular kind whether it be of a classic nature or of the very modern type. But as Catholics, we should hardly expect to hear this kind of music when we assemble to worship God in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, and when we reverently kneel before Him in the Blessed Sacrament. The Church does not need any assistance from the world in the form of secular music to convey her message, or to enhance the beauty of her worship. For worldly music can never replace the inspired melodies of faith and religion which make up the glorious heritage of the centuries.

High Masses Encouraged

The Bishop asks pastors, choir masters, organists and singers to do all in their power to make the High Mass musically and liturgically correct and complete. He urges the people to attend the High Mass in their parish churches on Sunday whenever possible, and to follow the celebration of the Mass by reading in their prayer books the Ordinary of the Mass. He urges all who are blessed with good voices to join in congregational singing, "which should be an important factor in every Catholic Church."

Tells About the Guild

"We are about to organize," says the Bishop's letter, "a Guild of Choir Masters, Organists and Teachers, engaged in choir work with the hope that, through special instructions and encouragement, they may be able to do much for the pastor in the parishes of the diocese in the matter of Church Music.

"We are asking you, dear Reverend Father, to read this letter to your congregation at all the Masses on Sunday, May 18th, and to add to it any word or suggestion you may wish to make in regard to the particular needs of your own parish.

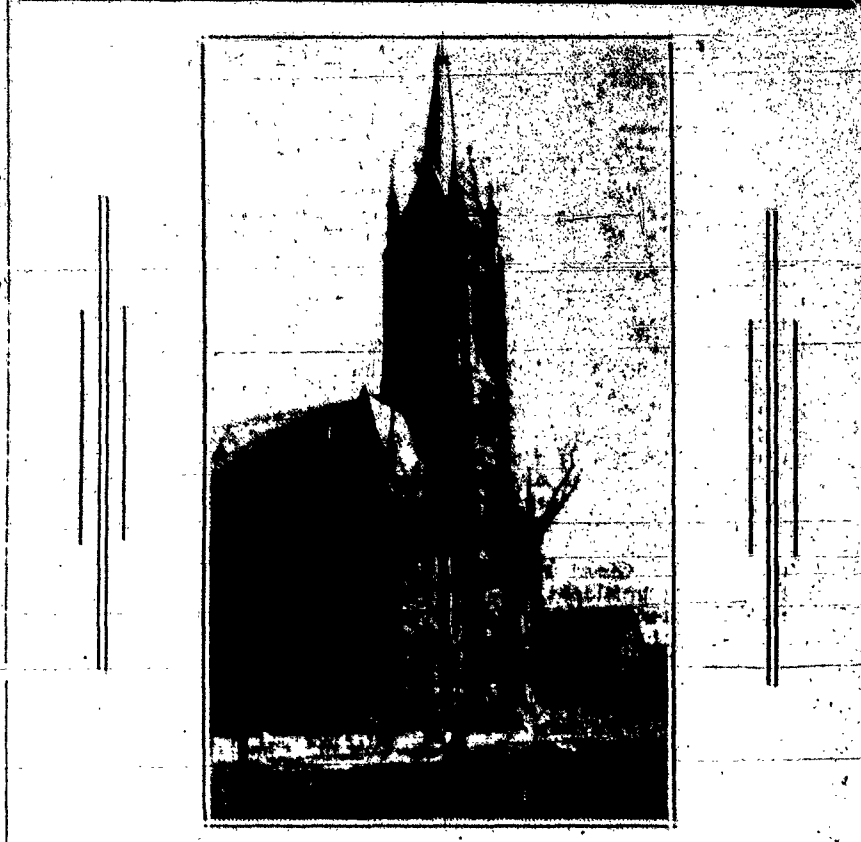


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
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
