

Bishop Names Committee For Church Music

Following the public letter of Bishop O'Hern, recently read in the pulpits of all the Catholic churches of the Diocese of Rochester on Church Music Reform, and following a conference of the pastors of the diocese, held at St. Andrew's Seminary on Tuesday, May 20th, the Bishop has announced the following members of the new Diocesan Music Commission, to be effective immediately:

Peter Mok is rector, and the other in St. Hyacinth's Church, of which the Rev. Jerome Holubowicz is rector. There were large congregations present at both ceremonies. This evening Bishop O'Hern is scheduled to speak at the annual banquet of the Holy Name Society of the Holy Family Church, to be held in the new auditorium on North Street.

Camp Madonna Season Begins On June 28th

Announcement is made by the Board of Directors of the Catholic Women's Club that its Camp for girls on Canandaigua Lake will open its eighth season on the last Saturday of June. The camp facilities for entertaining more girls than ever before. For the entire season of nine weeks, the camp will be given over to girls from 10 to 18 years, and registration may be made for the season, or by the month or week.

Camp Madonna is known as one of the beauty spots of the Finger Lake region. It has a shore line of 1,200 feet on Canandaigua Lake. The house nestles among rarely beautiful trees on a plot of over seven acres, with woods and stems forming a background. Formerly a private estate, the house appeals to parents and guardians because of its seclusion, which makes for great comfort in cool weather, and its modern improvements. There are no mosquitoes. The girls sleep in the open on large screened porches or indoors, as desired. Rising bell is at 7:00 and all lights are out at 9:30. The camp gates close at 7:00 P. M., and the complexity of modern living does not enter the Camp life.

In addition to the staff, the camp is administered by a committee within the Club of which Mrs. John Gysel is chairman, and the following ladies are members: Miss Alice F. Kirk, Mrs. Wendell E. Andrews, Mrs. John M. Foley, Mrs. P. D. Kane, Mrs. M. H. Koch, Mrs. Frances Fox Moynihan, Mrs. Edward J. Rooney, Mrs. Louis A. Whalen and Miss Cecelia M. Yawman.

Administered as a private Camp by the Catholic Women's Club, its capacity is limited to 50 girls. The rates are very reasonable, and full particulars may be had by calling the Club, Stone 4550. The Camp is open to any girl from 10 to 18 years of age.

St. Philip Neri, Apostle of Rome, Feast Observed

Rome, May 29.—Civic and ecclesiastical authorities united Monday in celebration of the feast of St. Philip Neri, known as "the apostle of Rome," founder of the Oratorian Order and co-patron with St. Peter of the Italian capital.

St. Philip, who died in 1595, was canonized 27 years after his death. His body lies in the Church of Santa Maria in Vallicella, where masses were said, beginning at an early hour Monday.

At the conclusion of the noon mass, Prince Francesco Ludovico, Governor of Rome, went to the church and presented to the chapter an engraved silver chalice as the homage of the municipality. This ceremony, for a long time in abeyance, was revived with the advent of the Fascist regime and is designed to symbolize the improved relations between the church and state in Italy.

Relatives and friends of the graduates are invited to attend. A reception will follow the exercises, and the evening will be a delightful one for everybody.

Herman M. Killian, formerly of Rochester, will be ordained to the priesthood in Washington, D. C., on Monday, June 16th, by the Most Rev. Michael J. Curley, D. D., Archbishop of Baltimore. The ordination will take place in St. Dominic's Church. Relatives from this city, and from his former home in Utica, N. Y., will be present. He will be ordained a priest of the Order of St. Dominic, with which Order he has been studying for several years past.

The first solemn high Mass of Father Killian will be sung by him in his home church, St. Mary's South Street, Utica, N. Y., on Sunday, June 23d, at 10:30 A. M. Relatives and friends are cordially invited to be present at the ordination, and also at the first Mass.

Herman M. Killian is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Killian of 1,128 Neilson Street, Utica, N. Y. His boyhood was spent in that city, but before going away to study for the priesthood he had made his home in Rochester for some time, living with his sister, Mrs. A. Kathryn Jewett, 197 Albemarle Street. He has another sister in Rochester, Mrs. Harold Gray, also of Albemarle Street. He is a splendid type of young man, and all of his friends will wish him every blessing and happiness in his work as a priest of God.
