Hickey, D.D., titular Archbishop of Wilmington, was happily observed at the St. Mark's Motherhouse in Pittsford, on Saturday morning, May 24th. There, with his good friend, the Bishop of Rochester, the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., the Bishop of Charleston, S. C., the Rt. Rev. Emmett M. Walsh, D.D., the Rt. Rev. John P. Neenan, D.D., and Rev. John F. Hickey, D.D., the anniversary in a way that was dear to his heart will be remembered with ceremony, and quietly and happily.

Bishop Walsh's Sermon

The sermon was preached by Bishop Walsh.

"It is a rare privilege," said Bishop Walsh, "to stand in this holy place and represent your beloved friends, and the priests and Sisters of the Rochester Diocese and congratulate you on the 25 years you have spent in the service of God. It is a rare privilege to stand here and tell you that joy permeates your hearts, and radiates from the center to yours. You were guided by one desire, an intense desire to do always as the Church would have you do."
